First Mothers' Union awards for tackling gender and domestic abuse

Mothers' Union groups from two parishes in Derry and Raphoe have become the first in the UK or Ireland to



receive the organisation's coveted Gold 'Rise Up' awards for their work to tackle gender-based violence and domestic abuse.



Representatives of the Christ Church Strabane and St Columb's Cathedral & Templemore groups were presented with their awards at an event in Glendermott Parish Hall on Saturday by MU's Provincial (All Ireland) President, June Butler. To earn the award, branches have to organise opportunities for local people to engage with political leaders

about domestic abuse issues, engage with vulnerable groups affected by abuse, commit to pray for MU's global efforts to counter genderbased violence and appoint a champion to lead on domestic abuse work.

Three other branches, Raphoe, Castlerock & Dunboe and the Balteagh Group's, were presented with bronze awards.

These require groups to connect with and support local domestic abuse support organisations, put up RISE UP posters in public places to raise awareness, and to commit to pray for those affected by domestic abuse, including victims, survivors, perpetrators and those who work in the field.

## Prestigious International School Award for Belfast school

RBAI (Inst) has been awarded the British Council's prestigious International School Award in recognition of its work to bring the world into the classroom.

The International School Award celebrates the achievements of schools that do exceptional work in international education. Fostering an international dimension in the curriculum is at the heart of the British Council's work with schools so that young people gain the cultural understanding and skills they need for life work in today's world.

The re-accreditation recognises the involvement of departments and activities across the school: the Rugby Club with the partnership with Blackrock College, Dublin; the Cricket Club with its tour to Dubai; the Geography Department with its visit to Iceland; the History and German Department with its visit to Munich; and the significant contribution of the Spanish Department with its partnership with in Jaén, Spain.

# Former Archbishop of Canterbury key speaker at Dublin seminar

Dr Rowan
Williams, former
Archbishop of
Canterbury, will



be the speaker at a two day seminar in Balally parish at the end of this month.

The Second Annual Dermot Lane Seminar takes place on September 28 and 29 in the Church of the Ascension of the Lord, Balally, Dublin, D16EO32.

The theme of the seminar is "A noisy world in need of Meditation and Service" and Dr Williams will give three lectures. His visit to Dublin will conclude with a Eucharistic service in Christ Church Taney on Sunday September 29 at 7pm which will be celebrated by Archbishop Michael Jackson (all welcome).

This annual event is held in honour of Fr Dermot Lane, theologian,

author, teacher, ecumenist and pastor who served as Parish Priest for 25 years in Balally parish and is currently the

parish Chaplain. When Fr Jim Caffrey PP was appointed to Balally parish in late 2021, he wanted to find a way to celebrate the prophetic theology and pastoral leadership of Fr Dermot. The plan to have an annual event was agreed with the Parish Pastoral Council. In 2023 the first Dermot Lane event was held with keynote speaker Professor John Fitzgerald, Irish Economist, on Care for our Common Home – putting this into practice.

Dr Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury was invited to speak in Balally after Fr Jim and some of the Parish Pastoral Council attended a seminar lead by Dr Williams at the World Community for Christian Meditation in Bonnevaux, France last November.

The theme of the seminar is complementary to the mission of Balally parish which is to become disciples of Jesus through Meditation and Service.

On Saturday September 28 the first session starts at 10.30am, when Dr Rowan Williams will present on Graced by the Holy Spirit of God after which there will be short responses from Fr Dermot and Rev Stephen Taylor of Dundrum Methodist Church. On Saturday afternoon starting at 2pm Dr Williams will present on Contemplation: Journey Inwards followed by short responses from Fr Dermot and Rev Nigel Pierpoint, Rector of Taney Parish.

On Sunday September 29 at 3pm, Dr Williams will present on Working together for justice and the care for our common home. This will be followed by a panel discussion with retired Archbishop of Armagh, the Rt Revd Richard Clarke, author of Playing Dice with God: The Risk of Discipleship

(Dominican Publications 2024), Fr Peter McVerry, social activist, Dr Margaret Daly Denton, theologian and author of John: An Earth Bible Commentary: supposing Him to be the Gardener (London 2017) Jane Mellett, Church Outreach Manager with Trócaire.

All three lectures will conclude with a short question and answer forum. There will also be an opportunity to visit the new Icon Chapel in Balally on Saturday for those who have not seen it yet.

An Ecumenical Service will be held at 4.30pm in Balally on Sunday celebrated by the clergy from the Dundrum Partnership of the Catholic Churches Balally, Dundrum, Ballinteer, Meadowbrook, Church of Ireland Taney/St Nahi and Dundrum Methodist Church.


At 7pm on Sunday evening there will be a Eucharistic Service in Christ Church, Taney celebrated by Archbishop Michael Jackson and Dr Rowan Williams.

Fr Jim Caffrey PP says: "Honouring Fr Dermot through the annual seminar places his work in an ecumenical context. Having Dr Rowan Williams as the keynote speaker is a blessing. Here in Ballally we are trying to build a Contemplative parish and Rowan is a contemplative in action. Recovering our common Celtic and monastic traditions is something all our churches can do together, as they come from a time when we were united. It is one of the great joys of my ministry to work with Rev Nigel Pierpoint and Rev Jane Burns and our friends in Taney ".

This two-day event is a unique opportunity to hear from Dr Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, a world-renowned theologian, poet and author; and to hear from other expert speakers on the need for meditation and service in a noisy world.

Everyone is welcome to attend one, two or all three presentations in Balally and to join as a community in the services and prayers over the two days in Balally and in Taney on Sunday evening.

## Dedication of Arranmore Island RNLI lifeboat

The Dean of
Raphoe, Very Rev
Liz Fitzgerald, was
one of two

involved in the recent Service of Dedication at the opening of the new lifeboat station on Arranmore Island off Donegal.

A former Rector of the Gweedore and Templecrone Group of Parishes, Dean Fitzgerald was joined by Rev Michael Classon, who attended the dedication of the previous



Lifeboat station, 29 years ago, and whose daughter-in-law, Anna Classon, is RNLI Head of Region.

The other clergy who led the Service of Dedication were Fr Pat Ward, Fr John Attoch and Fr John Joe Duffy. Two of the participating clergy had strong links with the sea. Fr Duffy, who grew up in a fishing family in Burtonport, was training for the priesthood when he lost his father in a drowning in accident in Burtonport harbour. And Dean Fitzgerald's husband, Sean, a retired merchant seaman, once had to issue a Mayday call after the vessel he was commanding got into difficulties off the coast of Shetland.

The Dean paid tribute to the RNLI for the assurance they give to Merchant Navy families – knowing they are ever ready to rescue and save their loved ones.

Donegal Person of the Year, Moya Brennan, spoke briefly before unveiling a plaque to officially open the new station.

The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Rt Rev Andrew Forster, has appointed the Dean of Raphoe, Very Rev Liz Fitzgerald, as Rural Dean of the Raphoe and Inishowen Rural Deaneries.

The announcement comes just over a year after Dean Fitzgerald became the Diocese's first female dean following her appointment as Rector of the Grouped Parishes of Raphoe, Raymochy and Clonleigh and Dean of St Eunan's Cathedral.

There are eight rural deaneries in the Diocese of Derry and Raphoe, and the Rural Deans help the Bishop with aspects

of oversight in their designated areas. Dean Fitzgerald replaces Rev Canon David Crooks who retired recently.



## Hymn commissioned by King performed for first time on Songs of Praise - Daily Telegraph

Crathie, named after the Royal family's beloved tiny chapel at Balmoral, was broadcast on the second anniversary of Elizabeth II's death, writes Victoria Ward, Deputy Royal Editor.

A new tune for a hymn commissioned by the King in honour of the Royal family's beloved tiny chapel at Balmoral will be broadcast for the first time on Sunday, the second anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's death.

The piece, Crathie, is named after Crathie Kirk, where the late Queen was a valued member of the congregation for seven decades.

It was composed by Prof Paul Mealor and set to the words of traditional hymn Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing.

The hymn will be performed publicly for the first time on the BBC's Songs of Praise, during a special episode about the church; Crathie Kirk – Mountains and Majesty.

Prof Mealor, who has composed music for national and royal occasions including the wedding of the Prince and Princess of Wales in 2011 and the King's Coronation last year, said: "This place here, Crathie, is such a glorious place.

"It's had a huge history of the Royal family right back to Queen Victoria, and it's not got its own hymn. Well, now it does."

When at Balmoral during the summer months, the family take their seats in the royal pews at Crathie Kirk, an unassuming Church of Scotland chapel within the grounds of the estate.

The parish church is very much part of family life. It is where the Princess Royal married her second husband, Vice Admiral Sir Timothy Laurence, and where senior royals sought solace during a short service of prayer on September 10, 2022, just two days after the Queen's death.

It is also where the King and Queen will worship in private on Sunday, as they mark the second anniversary of his accession.

**Rev Kenneth MacKenzie** has been minister at the church for more than 20 years and as a personal chaplain to the late monarch, was called to Balmoral castle on the day before she died.

"It happened here, the death, and that was particularly poignant, obviously for us. We felt that loss because there was that connectedness with this area," he said.

Asked how it felt to be a chaplain to both the late Queen and now, her eldest son, he added: "I find it hugely rewarding, a real privilege, and getting to spend time with them at moments of good times, and not so good times, of course.

"The Queen would speak to me about church life and parish life. She would ask me about individual people in the parish, 'how is so-and-so doing?' She very much felt part of this worship.

"She was very clear about her faith, and it wasn't just going to church. Faith was real, it was deep, and I think she had a real sense of calling. She had a very, very clear sense that she had a responsibility to this nation that was given to her, to some extent, by God."

On preaching to the royals, the minister added: "There is something rather surreal of course but we are aware of the fact that these are people that have come as part of our congregation. But there is obviously something rather special about it."

Queen Victoria first worshipped at Crathie Kirk in 1848 and laid the foundation stone for the new, improved church 1893.

"It's not a royal church, it's a parish church, part of the Church of Scotland," Rev MacKenzie said.

"Queen Victoria was very clear that she was a local landowner, and she should go where her people were to worship."

Songs of Praise is thought to be the world's longest running religious television programme. It first aired in 1961 from the Tabernacle Baptist Church in Cardiff and has since been filmed in churches and cathedrals across the UK.

The late Queen congratulated the programme as it marked its 60th anniversary in 2021, applauding the series for showing Christianity as "a living faith".

#### Conman cleric's cheek as he digs in at £500k rectory

Sunday Life. Belfast Telegraph - Man of fraud Rev Adrian McLaughlin is still holed up in his luxury, church-owned home despite stealing £10,000 from its accounts.

Three months after being found guilty by a jury, the shamed cleric has yet to quit the detached £500,000 pad next to St Colman's Church in Dunmurry, on the outskirts of Belfast.

McLaughlin, who told a tissue of lies in the witness box and tried to falsely implicate his ex-wife, was due to be sentenced last Friday.

However, the case was put back until this Tuesday, with a judge warning the conman he could face a prison term.

How local church fire was hijacked by bigots around the world to fuel anti-Islam hate

Sunday Life. Belfast Telegraph. As darkness descended last Sunday, an inferno seriously damaged the Greenisland Church of Ireland building and completely destroyed the parish hall.

Police and firefighters quickly declared it a suspected arson, adding to the sadness of those who'd celebrated, mourned and worshipped in a church which had just marked its 70th anniversary.
