# International ecumenical thanksgiving service celebrating St Brigid 1500

On Thursday 1 February 2024, churches across Kildare and beyond will come together to participate in a special ecumenical service at 11am in St Brigid's Cathedral, Kildare entitled, 'Celebrating St Brigid. Brigid 1500: A Service of Thanksgiving'.

This service, dedicated to commemorating the feast day of St Brigid and the 1500th anniversary of her death, promises an uplifting experience through music, prayer, and worship.

The co-leaders of this thanksgiving service are the Most Rev Denis Nulty, Roman Catholic Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, and the Most Rev Patricia Storey, Church of Ireland Bishop of Meath and Kildare. The Reverend Canon Dr Alison Joyce, Rector of St Bride's Church, Fleet Street in the heart of London, will deliver the sermon.

At the end of the service, a Pause for Peace will be observed in the cathedral at 12 noon, aligning with a broader initiative whereby the people of Kildare are



### **Bishop William Lee - a tribute by Archbishop Eamon Martin**

# Archbishop Eamon writes - I was very sad to learn of the death yesterday of Bishop William Lee.

As a priest of the Archdiocese of Cashel & Emly, and later as Bishop of the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore, Bishop Lee devoted his whole life to the service of the Gospel and to the mission of the Church.

In my role as President of the Irish Bishops Conference I wish to acknowledge in particular Bishop Lee's immense contribution to the life and work of the Conference over twenty years, from 1993 until his early retirement due to ill health in 2013. During that time he served on the Bishops' Commission for Clergy, Seminaries and Vocations, as well as on the Commission for the Laity. Bishop Lee also held the post of President of Accord, the Catholic Marriage Care Service. His calm and faithful presence as Episcopal Secretary to the Conference for fifteen years was especially valued and appreciated by his brother bishops. I experienced this at a personal level from the time of my own appointment as Executive Secretary in the autumn of 2008.

Bishop Lee took a particular interest in matters related to the formation of priests, reflecting his long involvement with seminary life. At the same time he had a strong appreciation of the vocation of marriage and, in his contributions to discussions within the Conference, he was anxious to ensure that preparation and support for marriage and the family was central in the pastoral life of the Church. His interventions at the Commission for Planning, Resources and Communications were typically wise and balanced.

On behalf of the Bishops' Conference, I wish to express my condolences to Bishop Lee's family, to Bishop Alphonsus Cullinan of Waterford & Lismore, to the priests, religious and faithful of the Archdiocese of Cashel & Emly and of the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore, and to all who knew and loved him. I also wish to express appreciation for all those who cared for him over many years of struggling with poor health.

May the light of Heaven shine upon him; may God in his loving mercy look kindly upon him and may he receive the welcome of the good and faithful servant. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam dilís.

## Chris Heaton-Harris letter challenges Dublin on its legacy prosecutions record -News Letter

The UK government has challenged Ireland to set out its own record on tackling legacy issues, as it formally registered its regret at Dublin's decision to take legal action against its Troubles legislation.

Northern Ireland Secretary Chris Heaton-Harris has written to Irish Minister for Foreign Affairs, Micheal Martin, questioning the move by Ireland's government to challenge the UK's contentious legacy laws in the European Court of Human Rights.

The British Ambassador to Ireland Paul Johnston issued the letter on Sunday evening.

In it, Mr Heaton-Harris again challenges Mr Martin to list the number of prosecutions mounted in the Irish state since 1998 related to Troubles incidents.

Aspects of the recently passed UK laws include a limited form of immunity from prosecution for Troubles-related offences for those who co-operate with the new Independent Commission for Reconciliation and Information Recovery (ICRIR).

The Northern Ireland Troubles (Legacy and Reconciliation) Act 2023 will also halt future civil cases and legacy inquests.

The UK government's laws are opposed by many victims' groups in Northern Ireland and all the main Stormont parties.

Announcing the interstate case in December, Taoiseach Leo Varadkar said his administration was left with "no option" but to legally challenge the UK government over the legacy act.

He said the "strong" legal advice was that the UK legacy act breached the UN Convention on Human Rights.



Tanaiste Mr Martin said they were taking the case reluctantly after having spent time trying to change the UK government's mind.

The Northern Ireland Office (NIO) confirmed to the PA news agency that a letter had been issued formally registering "profound regret" at the interstate case.

"The Secretary of State, in his letter, repeats his call for the Irish government to clarify the number of criminal prosecutions brought in Ireland since 1998 relating to Troubles-related cases, and presses the Irish government more widely to answer questions regarding its own record on tackling legacy issues in its own jurisdiction," the NIO said in a statement.

The letter criticises the timing of the Irish decision, describing it as a "delicate time" in Northern Ireland amid the efforts to restore power-sharing at Stormont.

The NIO added: "The decision also comes before the Independent Commission for Reconciliation and Information Recovery, led by Sir Declan Morgan as chief commissioner, is fully established and able to demonstrate its ability to discharge the UK's international obligations.

"The UK government reasserts its particular disappointment that the Irish government has taken this course of action without, to date, any engagement with the ICRIR to understand better how it intends to implement the legislation and deliver for victims and survivors."

### Down & Dromore Parish Readers' Training Course

Parish Readers are people of all ages and from all walks of life who have a calling to assist in leading public worship. The next four-week training course begins on Wednesday 23 January 2024 in St Ignatius, Carryduff.

The role usually involves the reading of liturgy, bible readings, prayers and assisting at Holy Communion. Parish Readers may assist in any or all of the ways outlined above and on a regular or occasional basis depending on how they are needed by the Rector. While the role is normally restricted to involvement in public worship it is significant in its support for clergy leading the service.

Parish Readers should undergo a short training course of 4 weeks before being approved to exercise this ministry. They must also have the support of their Rector before applying.

The approval granted for a Reader will normally last for 3 years and cease on the appointment of a new Rector.

The course covers the following topics:

23 January: The Daily Office and Service of the Word

30 January: Key factors in leading worship and leading intercessions

6 February: Prayer Book Overview – The Collects, calendar and lectionary
13 February Prayer Book Overview – Other useful services and additional resources

There is no cost for the course.
