Worker here at the Cork Centre of Mission in Carrigrohane Union, building on the existing youth ministry and also exploring more ways to be increasingly missionally focused. Abortion lessons ideological colonisation: Catholic leaders

Bushops accuse Heaton-Harris of forging a one-sided view on schoolchildren, Mark Bain writes in the Belfast Telegraph

Teaching schoolchildren about abortion amounts to "ideological colonisation" by the secretary of state and the Northern Ireland Human Rights Commission, Catholic leaders have said.

Bishops are angry with Westminster for pushing through plans to teach pupils about access to terminations and prevention of early pregnancy.

The comments from senior clergy, including Primate of All-Ireland Archbishop Eamon Martin, came at the Summer General Meeting of the Irish Bishops' Conference in Maynooth, with the bishops rejecting what they described as "radical legislation".



Introducing Juno - Officially named by The Queen at a special ceremony at Clarence House, Drum Horse Juno is the first mare to take on this iconic role, and will lead the Household Cavalry Band at The King's Birthday Parade this weekend.

They urged Northern Ireland Secretary Chris Heaton-Harris "to recognise the rights of parents to be involved in decisions affecting their children".

"Having already imposed some of the most radical abortion laws in the world on the people of Northern Ireland, without their consent, the secretary of state now seems determined to impose an ideologically biased view of abortion on all schools, irrespective of parental rights or school ethos," the bishops said.

"This is radical legislation the government doesn't even impose on schools in Britain, where the right of parents to be involved in decisions about such ethical and pastoral issues is fully respected.

"There is no such thing as a neutral view on abortion. There is no such thing as a value-free or ethically neutral approach to the question of when life begins and when we have a duty to protect and care for all human life.

"These are matters subject to sincerely held differences of opinion across the world.

"It is not for a government to impose one ideological approach on children, parents or on our schools over others.

"This is why the right of parents to an education for their children that is in accordance with their ethical, religious and philosophical convictions is an internationally recognised human right.

"We call on the secretary of state to respect the internationally recognised rights of parents, and the principles of consultation and devolution in the Good Friday Agreement, and to withdraw this legislation, leaving it to the devolved Assembly to decide, in consultation with parents and educational stakeholders."

The bishops were also critical of a new report from the Northern Ireland Human Rights Commission (NIHRC) into relationships and sex education (RSE) in schools, which said Northern Ireland lagged far behind other parts of the UK.

It also found that "many schools use language that shames and stigmatises young people".

The bishops said: "Like the recent so-called investigation of the NIHRC into RSE in schools, the secretary of state is also indulging in a tired and, frankly, offensive caricature of what our outstanding teachers are actually doing in our schools in this area.

"Our Catholic Schools' Trustees Service will be writing to those who carried out the recent NIHRC 'investigation' to express the trustees' serious concerns about the accuracy and fairness of the report.

"Neither party took the trouble to engage with teachers in the classroom.

"The secretary of state and the NIHRC need to move away from their tendency to ideological colonisation in this area, and trust parents, teachers, young people and politicians in Northern Ireland to balance the rights and responsibilities involved."

The Transferor Representatives' Council, which represents the Church of Ireland, Presbyterian Church and Methodist Church in education issues, also rejected claims made in the NIHRC report.

TRC chair Dr Andrew Brown said the paper did not reflect the reality on the ground.

He added: "The recommendations put forward in the report are based on a paper exercise and are not at all reflective of Church News Ireland Page 14

Belfast church welcomes relic of Italian teenager beatified by Pope Francis

A Belfast church has welcomed the relic of an Italian teenager beatified by Pope Francis, Suzanne McGonagle writes in the Irish News.

Crowds of people, including groups of school children, have been visiting St Paul's on the Falls Road to see the relic of Blessed Carlos Acutis.

It arrived on Tuesday after being previously received by Archbishop Eamon Martin at St Patick's Cathedral in Armagh on Sunday.

The relic of the 15-year-old has been brought to Ireland for three days by Monsignor Anthony Figueiredo, who is based in Assisi in Italy.

Blessed Carlo was beatified by Pope Francis on October 10, 2020, becoming the first millennial to be declared 'Blessed' by the Catholic Church.

Born in London to Italian parents, he grew up in Milan where from a young age, he displayed an extraordinary devotion to his Catholic faith and attended Mass daily, regularly received the sacraments as well as developing a deep love for the Eucharist.

He died in 2006 after a battle with leukemia.
