Busy Saturday on mission and ministry at Irish Methodist Conference

Perhaps conscious that there was some serious business to be done at Conference and despite churchnewsireland@gmail.com

the fact that it was early on a Saturday morning, the Rev Brian Fletcher urged us to listen carefully for the voice of God who knocks on the door and who wants to enter into an intimate relationship with us (Rev3 :14). We learn to hear that voice through prayer when we open ourselves to him completely and allow him to see behind the façade we show to the world. This relationship can only develop when our prayer involves listening as well as talking.

Conference delegates were asked to consider many issues during the day where the recurring theme was the need to discern the best way forward for the Church's mission in a world which is radically different from years gone by and one which is experiencing constant and rapid change. In many areas we are being 'asked to do more and more with less and less'. We considered how a changed political, economic and academic climate has impacted many areas of the Church including the training and education of our ministers and lay people, the work of our military, hospital and prison chaplains and our role in the education of young people.

There were many examples of how the Methodist Church in Ireland is responding positively to the challenges of the new

landscape with innovation and enthusiasm to advance the kingdom of God. For example, we heard from the Rev Winston Graham of how a step taken in trust and hope – the Covenant with the Church of Ireland – has been noted throughout the world as a model for partnership between Churches. We adopted the new name of ‘World Mission Partnership’ in place of the ‘Methodist Missionary Society’ to recognise that mission is no longer a one-way process involving a group or groups within the church but rather a two-way learning partnership in which the whole Church should be involved.

What was most evident throughout a day of discussion and debate about what is often deemed boring and overly bureaucratic – the administration of the Church – was the commitment and dedication by all those involved. Members of Church committees and boards sincerely desire that what they do and propose should be for the sole purpose of building up the people of God and to find the best way possible in today’s challenging world to respond to God’s call to mission.

First lay Methodist Youth Secretary

Gillian is the first lay person to hold this significant role in the life of the Methodist Church in Ireland.

Speaking to the many people, young and old, who had filled Edenderry Methodist Church, Portadown, on Saturday 18th June, Gillian thanked the Methodist Church for the trust that had been placed in her and expressed her excitement about what lay ahead. ‘People of faith, this is all of our call to pass on faith – to be people who are disciples, who make disciples,’ she said.

Gillian went on to speak of her passion to see young people knowing *who* they are and *whose* they are in Christ. ‘I am grateful to this Church family that shaped my identity,’ she said. ‘Our identity is formed in community, not on our own. We owe it to the next generation to do whatever it takes for the next generation.’

Derry Scouting Stalwart Honoured

Waterside man Albert Smallwoods has been presented with a 60-year Long Service Award by the Scout Movement in Northern Ireland.

It’s the first time that a member of the movement in County Londonderry has received a 60-year award.

Albert became an Assistant Scout Master in All Saints, Clooney in October 1955, although his

involvement with the Scout Movement pre-dates that. He joined the Cub Pack in Clooney in 1946.

Maynooth president takes leave of absence

The head of the national seminary at Maynooth is to step aside and take a leave of absence, it has been confirmed.

The Irish Catholic - Following the year-long sabbatical, Msgr Connolly will formally step down as president and return to the teaching staff – the first rector of the seminary to do so in almost 50 years.

The Irish Catholic learned over the weekend that Msgr Connolly had asked the trustees of the college – chaired by Archbishop Eamon Martin – to take leave of his position. Calls to Msgr Connolly for comment went unreturned as *The Irish Catholic* went to print, but a statement was later posted on the college website confirming the news.

The statement said that Msgr Connolly “has advised the staff of the Faculty of Theology of his plans to take sabbatical leave for the academic year 2016–2017”.

While absent from the college, the statement added that he will “remain as President until the completion of his statutory term in the summer of 2017 and he will continue to exercise some duties during the year”.

Allegations

It comes after a string of controversial allegations about life in the seminary. Last year, a number of student priests were reportedly asked

to take time out of Maynooth because they were judged to be ‘too conservative’ – an allegation that the college authorities denied.

Last month, *The Irish Catholic* reported that the hierarchy had expressed concern after an anonymous whistle-blower claimed in a letter that some seminarians had been guilty of misconduct of a homosexual nature.

At the time, Msgr Connolly insisted that any allegations of misconduct are handled robustly by the college authorities.

Vice-president Fr Michael Mullaney, will serve as acting-president and assume day-to-day responsibility for running the college.

In 1968, Msgr Patrick Corish stepped down after less than a year as president of Maynooth and returned to the teaching staff – the last president to make such a move. Msgr Connolly – who was appointed president in 2007 – will take up the post of Professor of Moral Theology on his return from sabbatical.

Msgr Connolly did not return calls as *The Irish Catholic* went to press and queries were directed to the Catholic Communications Office who referred only to the statement on the Maynooth website.
