Green and white army outreach tonight by Derry parish

As Northern Ireland take to the field tonight (Thursday) for their crucial European Championship clash with Ukraine, they'll be

roared on back home by parishioners of St. Paul's Parish, Garvagh, who will be hosting a simultaneous 'International Football Night'.

The event, in the local Rangers Club, is part of the Parish's contribution to the diocesan Year of Opportunity 2016. The Rector of Errigal and Desertoghill, the Rev Paul Whittaker, is chaplain of Glenavon Football Club, who won the Irish Cup this year. The trophy will be on display at Thursday evening's event.

A team of distinguished football pundits will be joining fans to provide pre-match, half-time and post-match comment and reaction on the Northern Ireland-Ukraine game. They are the Glenavon manager (and former Northern Ireland International) Gary Hamilton; ex-Glentoran and Glenavon player Philip Mitchell; and former Coleraine start – and popular BBC Sport analyst – Liam Beckett.

Every army (and a 'green and white army' is no exception) marches on its stomach, so burgers and hot dogs will be served at half-time. The Parish 'International Football Night' is open to everyone and anyone, including children.

The club will be open from 4pm, in plenty of time for the 5pm kick-off.

Ecumenical celebration of 50th anniversary of the Anglican Centre in Rome

Anglican and Roman Catholic leaders were joined by senior figures from other Christian denominations last night at a special choral evensong in Westminster Abbey to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Anglican Centre in Rome.

Anglican, Catholic and Orthodox Church leaders were present at the service, which was sung by the Westminster Abbey Choir. In hissermon, Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby praised the work of the Centre, and its director, Archbishop David Moxon, joking that the centre was seen by some as the Anglican Communion's spy station in Rome.

"Those are the first time I heard those words this evening," Archbishop David told *ACNS* afterwards, "but I think in terms of intelligent reporting, in terms of a careful look at each other, in terms of good communication and awareness of each other, it is a humorous and anecdotal description which I enjoy."

The service, he said, summed up "50 years of faith, hope and love", and he added: "The Anglican Centre is a bit like a fiddler on the roof: it needs funding every year, it can't guarantee its existence, but it tries to play a tune of faith, hope, love; to try to suggest that what unites us is greater than what divides us. That's the point.

"And we stand on that roof, playing that tune, saying to people 'look up! The Holy Spirit is trying to build bridges all the time.' We are part of that

process, part of that energy," he said, adding that God gives the courage and hope needed to build bridges between the denominations.

"Sometimes people get a little cynical about ecumenism. Sometimes they wonder what the point is," he said. "But living and working in Rome you can see the point. And now, especially, with this Pontificate – with Pope Francis and with Archbishop Justin – there is all kinds of evidence that it is worth it.

"The Pope and Archbishop Justin are saying Let's behave as if we are one where we can, even though we haven't agreed on everything. And in some cases the differences seem quite significant, but let's behave as if we are one for the sake of the Kingdom of God, for justice and peace."

He said that collaborative work on issues of justice, people trafficking, refugees and city missions were "all ways in which the world needs our solidarity, our co-operation [and] our partnership."

This was, he said, a new kind of ecumenism which was driven by mission. "Rather than just trying to close the dogmatic gaps – which are

important to close – these two [Pope Francis and Archbishop Justin] are saying let's generate a sense of communion now, where we can, on the ground.

"The more you walk together the better you talk together. A lot of people think you can only walk together once you have talked together enough. I think it is often the other way around."

Presbyterian Church increases its services to people with a learning disability

The Presbyterian Church already provides services for people with a learning disability in Northern Ireland, which includes Residential Respite Care, Day Care and Supported Living schemes. This decision will now be able to increase its service provision in the Republic of Ireland.

Lindsay Conway, Director and Secretary to PCI's Council for Social Witness, which has overall management responsibility for these and other services, said, "The Council has wide-ranging experience of working with adults with a learning disability and is delighted to add Peacehaven in Greystones to its Residential Care, Day Care and

Supported Living schemes. We are also pleased that this will enable us to expand our witness in the Republic of Ireland.

"We look forward in the weeks ahead to developing our relationships with the 16 residents, staff and family members in Greystones. At the same time, we would also want to acknowledge the Christian work undertaken in the past by the members, the Board and the staff of Peacehaven Trust."

Geoffrey Hanan, Acting Chair and Director of Peacehaven Trust Limited said that Peacehaven has a clear vision and passion of empowering adults with a range of disabilities and appropriate support to live independent lives within their community.

"With a view to ensuring the continued and enhanced delivery of Peacehaven's services to residents, present and future, I am absolutely delighted that we are consolidating our activities into those of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's Council for Social Witness.

"PCI shares, and I am confident will protect, our Christian ethos and values which will continue, according to God's Will, to shape everything we do for the people we support, our staff and all other stakeholders. As always, God's timing has been perfect," he said.

Mr. Hanan also said that the alignment with PCI's ethos, governance arrangements and strategic focus, alongside the fusion of joint operations and staff expertise, would sustain and enhance Peacehaven's work into the future.

"Delivering the best possible service for the people we support, maintaining employment and continuing to work to His Glory with all stakeholders, are key priorities for Peacehaven," Mr. Hanan added.

C of I Global-shaping mission conferences

The Church of Ireland Council for Mission has announced two one-day conferences to raise awareness of overseas mission within the Church of Ireland. The title – 'Global Shaping Local: Two-way Mission' – reflects the Council's hope of increasing the Church's understanding of its calling to assist the developing world, while also acknowledging that we have much to learn from the developing world in its experience and approach to faith and mission.

The keynote speaker at both events will be the Revd Dr Mark Welsh, Mission Development Officer with the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. There will be an interview with a mission partner and a choice of five workshops, facilitated by the Association of Missionary Societies (AMS).

The Council for Mission is inviting every parish in the country to send a representative, to inform themselves of the current challenges in overseas mission and how we can better address mission in our local context. Participants will have the opportunity to attend two of the following workshops: Engaging Youth in Mission; Helping without Hurting; The Bible as a Key to Mission; The Five Marks of Mission; and Two-way Mission: When Global Shapes Local.



Pocket History and Heritage Trail of Presbyterians in Ulster

For four centuries Presbyterians have represented one of the most important elements in the population of Ireland. Their influence has been strongest in the history of the northern province of Ulster where for over 300 years they have constituted a majority of the Protestant population. The origins of the Presbyterian churches in Ireland can be traced to Scotland and to the successive waves of immigration of Scottish families to this island in the 1600s.



This folding map/pocket history looks at the story of Ulster's Presbyterians, highlighting the emergence of the historic Presbyterian denominations, the role of Presbyterians in the 1798 Rebellion and the formation of Northern Ireland, and the contribution of Presbyterians to education and the mission field. It also includes

information on 30 sites where you can discover at first hand the richly textured history of Presbyterianism in Ulster.

Ecumenical devotional to mark Reformation anniversary

A new daily devotional produced by Anglican and Lutheran church leaders will be published later this year to help Christians in the two communions commemorate together next year's 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation.

Work on the book, *Grace upon Grace: Voices* around the World, was substantially completed during last month's meeting of the Anglican –

<u>Lutheran International Coordinating Committee</u> in Adelaide, Australia.

In a <u>communiqué</u> from the meeting, those engaged in the ecumenical dialogue say that the material, which will be available in hard copy and as a downloadable PDF file, "illustrates the constant need for all churches be open to reform and renewal by the Holy Spirit."

Over the course of six weeks, users of the daily devotional will consider themes of God's mission in the world (*Mission Dei*), Liberated by God's grace, Salvation – not for sale, Human beings – not for sale, Creation – not for sale, and Freed to serve (*Diakonia*).

Shortly after the Anglican – Lutheran International Coordinating Committee met, another ecumenical dialogue, the <u>Anglican – Old Catholic International Co-ordinating Council</u>, gathered for their meeting in Ghent, Belgium.

The Church of England entered into full communion with the Old Catholic Churches in July 1931 under what is known as the Bonn Agreement. This has since been extended to all member churches of the Anglican Communion. In their communiqué, members of the ecumenical

dialogue say that they had begun to "explore creatively" how to mark the centenary of the Bonn Agreement in 2031.

During their meeting, the ecumenical representatives looked at ways to "develop concrete proposals for the common mission of the Anglican and Old Catholic Churches on the European continent"; and were joined by Bishop Pierre Whalon of the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, part of the US-based Episcopal Church; Bishop Robert Innes, the Church of England's Bishop of Gibraltar in Europe; and Archbishop Joris Vercammen of the Utrecht Union of Old Catholic Churches.

100 year old West Belfast man honoured for services to the Catholic Church

A West Belfast man who turned 100 this week is to be honoured with the prestigious Benemerenti medal for his services to the Catholic Church.

Irish News - Billy Burns, from Ballymurphy, is to receive the rare accolade, awarded by the Pope, for his life-long devotion to the Church.

The centenarian has served in the parish of Corpus Christi for 65 years and has also just been recognised for his dedicated work to St Vincent de Paul.

In 1951, he responded to a request by a priest to take up the Sunday Mass collection and has been performing this service ever since.

During the building of new churches in the parish, including Corpus Christi and the Church of The Annunciation, the father-of-11 also prepared school halls where Mass was held during the renovations.

Mr Burns, originally from the Half Bap area of north Belfast - now known as the Cathedral Quarter - was also in the Fire Service during the Second World War and worked as a tiler in London.

Within the coming weeks, he will receive the Benemerenti medal all the way from Rome for his dedication to the Catholic Church.

It was originally established as an award to soldiers in the Papal Army, but later extended to clergy and the laity for services to the church.

Antrim Presbyterian minister 'sensationally sacked'

First Antrim Presbyterian is officially a church without a leader this week, after its Minister was sensationally sacked.

Antrim Guardian report - Lyle Creighton, the Clerk of Session, confirmed *last week* that Rev Bill Parker's tenure is over.

Following a swift enquiry by the Presbyterian Superior Court, it was decided that the 51-year-old should be 'loosed from his charge' with immediate effect.

In a statement to the shell-shocked congregation on Sunday, church leaders stressed that neither the Session nor Rev Parker had initiated the toplevel probe - but it was equally clear that it was an issue of irreconcilable differences running through the core of First Antrim.
