Archbishop Clarke's tribute to Belfast hospice

The Archbishop of Armagh, The Most Revd Dr Richard Clarke, has paid a warm tribute to the work of the Northern Ireland Hospice after visiting its new hospice building for adults at Somerton House in North Belfast. He remarked: "It's marvellous to see it going from an aspiration a few years ago to an absolutely wonderful facility for patients and their families."

C of I Gazette - During the visit, Archbishop Clarke viewed one of the 18 in–patient suites where a person can be accommodated and receive palliative care. Each suite includes a private bathroom, fridge and TV – and a bed for a visiting relative. Patients can also rest in a garden area and the building is decorated by artwork themed around care and togetherness, which features comments from patients.

The day services centre is a bright and spacious area where patients who require less intensive support can enjoy companionship, and receive therapy and a weekly symptoms check by specialist doctors and nurses. Each year, the Northern Ireland Hospice cares for around 3,000 people – most of whom receive that support at home. These community services will be coordinated from Somerton House and an education and research centre will help to further improve the quality of care.

The building includes a sanctuary for worship and spending quiet time with God in prayer and reflection and a relatives' room, which was generously funded by schoolchildren in the Belfast area. One hundred and twenty handheld crosses for patients have been provided by the nearby St Katherine's Parish Church; these have been crafted from olive wood grown in the Holy Land. The first patients moved into the new hospice in late May.

On his visit, Archbishop Clarke expressed his gratitude for the hospice's committed care for people experiencing terminal illness. "The end of life on Earth is such an important time for both patients and their families and they deserve the very best we can give them," he added. "It still seems sad that three—quarters of the cost of the hospice has to be found from private funding."

The £13 million building was designed by Consarc Design Group and constructed by H&J Martin Ltd. £6 million is needed to cover the adult hospice's annual running costs and a range of fundraising and volunteering opportunities are highlighted on the Northern Ireland Hospice's website: www.nihospice.org

Roadmap for European Reformation 500th anniversary

A celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, called the 'European Reformation

Roadmap,' will begin in November 2016 in Geneva, before touring across sites of significance through May 2017.

There will be activities in 67 cities in 18 countries, featuring a show truck — or "story-mobile" — travelling to different locations in Europe to support local events. The tour through Europe will start on 3 November in Geneva, the city of John Calvin, and now home to the head office of the World Council of Churches (WCC) and many other international organizations. The programme includes seminars, a panel discussion on peace and a digital exhibition.

The Revd Dr Emmanuel Fuchs, President of the Protestant Church in Geneva, says, "It is a great honour for us in the Protestant Church of Geneva (in partnership with the World Council of Churches, the Reformation Museum and the Federation of Swiss Protestant Churches) to launch this European tour of Reformation cities."

"Geneva, certainly, is a key city in the Reformation," Fuchs adds. "This Geneva stage of the tour gives us an opportunity, quite apart from its historical aspect, to emphasize Geneva's open, ecumenical and multicultural character. A certain 'spirit of Geneva', a product of the

Reformation, still permeates our city, beyond the churches."

Fuchs concludes: "So, the rich, varied programme, intended not only for the friends of the churches, but also for the whole population, for passersby who want to have a look, will provide, among other things, an opportunity to celebrate with our many immigrant communities, an opportunity for our young people from different religions to meet one another and have discussions, or even for families to see a puppet show. We look forward to seeing you on the Reformation Bus."

The culmination of the tour will be in central Germany, at the story-mobile's final stop in

Wittenberg, in time for a World Reformation Exhibition entitled 'Gates of Freedom'. There, churches from around the world and civil society exhibitors will present their activities over the summer, illustrating what the Reformation set in motion and what it still means today.

Bring 'order and honesty' back to football, Pope tells Fifa president

Pope Francis has urged the president of Fifa to bring "order and honesty" to football's world governing body.

During a meeting at the Vatican this week, the Pope told Infantino: "Clear paths, put things back in order and honesty. And football is a weapon, in a good way, it serves as an educational and social integration with the kids."

The Pope added that "with soccer, go forward showing honesty and cleanliness." In response, Infantino told Francis: "We want to do just that."

Fifa has been beset by allegations of widespread corruption for many years. Last summer the US

Department of Justice indicted several of the organisation's top executives and this was followed by long-serving president Sepp Blatter stepping down.

Shortly after he was elected as the new Fifa president in February, Infantino said "Fifa has gone through sad times, moments of crisis", but he "promised to restore (the organisation's) image."

US archdiocese offers \$65 million in compensation for sex abuse victims

The Archdiocese of St Paul and Minneapolis will compensate victims of abuse with more than \$65 million.

Their compensation plan outlines specific sources for funds available for victim remuneration, including at least \$8.7 million from the sale of archdiocesan properties, including three chancery buildings, as well as more than \$33 million from insurance settlements.

It establishes a trust for victim remuneration funds, with a court-approved allocation protocol.

The plan also includes settlements from parish insurers of approximately \$13.7 million with the potential for future settlements from archdiocesan insurers that are not currently entering into agreements with the archdiocese. The archdiocese is seeking to transfer the rights of recovery for those policies to the trustee of the trust for victims.

"We filed our plan today – at 16 months – because victims/survivors cannot be compensated until a plan for reorganisation is finalised and approved," Archbishop Bernard A Hebda of St Paul and Minneapolis said during a news conference last week.

"The longer the process lasts, more money is spent on attorneys' fees and bankruptcy expenses, and, in turn, less money is available for victims/survivors. ... We are submitting our plan now in the hope of compensating victims/survivors and promoting healing sooner rather than later."
