Pope marks World Water Day with appeal to stop water wars and waste

More than 12 children die every minute, from lack of clean drinking water. That's 1,800 children a day.

Marking World Water Day on Wednesday, Pope Francis reminded pilgrims at the General Audience that water is a primary necessity that must never be wasted, abused or serve as grounds for war. The annual day celebrates this primary need and raises awareness of the two billion people living without access to safe water.

Pope Francis said: "Water must never be the object of waste or abuse, or provide the grounds for war, but must be preserved for our benefit and that of future generations."

Recalling the words of St Francis of Assisi' in his ode to creation, Laudato si: "Praised be you, my Lord, through Sister Water, who is very useful and humble and precious and chaste."

In these simple words, he said "we feel the beauty of creation and the awareness of the challenges involved in caring for it."

The Pope noted that the second UN Water Conference is taking place at the United Nations headquarters in New York in these days.Thousands of delegates will attend the threeday Water Summit that began today.

"I pray for the success of the work and hope that the important event will accelerate initiatives in favour of those who suffer from the scarcity of water, this primary good," he said.

Ahead of the opening of the major UN water summit, a United Nations report warns of a looming global water crisis and an imminent risk of shortages due to overconsumption and climate change.

The report describes the world as "blindly travelling a dangerous path" of "vampiric overconsumption and overdevelopment."

WCC on climate change report: 'Equity is the path to sustainability'

World Council of Churches (WCC) general secretary Rev Prof Dr Jerry Pillay commented on the synthesis of the 6th Assessment Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, released 20 March.

"There is a rapidly closing window of opportunity to secure a liveable and sustainable future for all," the report underlines. "Rapid and far-reaching transitions across all sectors and systems are necessary."

The report also adds that our choices and actions-or inaction-in the next few years "will have impacts now and for thousands of years."

Pillay underscored that the climate emergency demands integrated and coordinated efforts. "The report clearly shows that climate change is not merely an environmental phenomenon but one with profound implications on economies, societies, and the health and livelihoods of people especially those living in poverty," he said. "This means that our response to the climate emergency must take an integrated and coordinated approach, understanding that mitigation and adaptation efforts are two sides of the same coin, comprehending the necessity of institutional, economic, and social transformation, and recognizing the need for global collaboration to unite our efforts."

A second message Pillay shared is that equity is the path to sustainability. "The report reveals that the way forward is a climate-resilient development that integrates actions to curb emissions with measures to adapt to climate change in ways that enhance people's health and livelihoods while at the same time reducing hunger, poverty, and inequality and delivering clean energy, water, and air for all," he said, adding a third point: "Climate solutions exist; political commitment is needed."

The report emphasizes that the Paris goal of limiting warming to 1.5 degrees celsius is still within reach if emissions are halved within the next seven years. "It brings together a range of tried and tested policy options to help achieve deep cuts in emissions and build climate resilient Church News Ireland Page 14

communities," noted Pillay. "Solutions are available. What is missing is political will."

But political will is not enough, he concluded. "The pursuit of short-term financial gains through aggressive land use and wanton resource extraction has wrought immeasurable costs to life and all creation and will impose a heavy burden on our children for millennia, imperilling their very future," he said. "As Christians we believe that life-in-creation is a sacred gift from God."

Northern Ireland charities 'in crisis' over Stormont funding scheme halt

Northern Ireland charities have said they face a funding crisis after an annual grant competition was halted days before the new financial year. The Department of Health's Core Grant Funding scheme opened in October, with £3.6m of funding to share out. But 256 bidders applied and the grants they sought exceeded £25m. The department has now suspended the process but will fund 64 existing recipients for just three months until it gets more clarity on its budget.
