Ukraine crisis: Moderator launches appeal

In response to the devastating Russian invasion of Ukraine and exodus of people from the country, Dr David Bruce, launched a Moderator's Appeal yesterday towards the emergency relief effort.

Continuing to encourage the Church to pray for the people of Ukraine, Dr Bruce also asked PCI members across Ireland to give generously to the Church's partners involved

in providing humanitarian aid to those fleeing the conflict and those trying to get aid into Ukraine.

Calling on PCI members to consider their response to this humanitarian emergency, the Moderator said, "I have launched a Moderator's Appeal towards the emergency relief effort to help people in Ukraine and those fleeing the conflict. I am confident our members will respond as generously, and sacrificially, as they have done on so many previous occasions," Dr Bruce said.

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI) is immediately releasing £60,000 (€72,350) to be distributed equally between its relief and development partners Christian Aid (Ireland) and Tearfund, and also to one of its partner churches, the Reformed Church in Hungary and its relief and development wing, Hungarian Reformed Church Aid.

Dublin Mothers Union members reconnect in hope and confidence

More than 70 members of Mothers' Union in Dublin & Glendalough cast off the shackles of the last two years and gathered for a joyful reunion at the Mothers' Union Breakfast 2022.

Lawson, who said her aim was to encourage members across Dublin & Glendalough to take small steps to reconnect in hope and confidence.

After a time of chat and catching up, members were addressed by All Ireland MU President, June Butler who spoke on the theme for 2022, 'Transformation Now!' She said transformation of Mothers' Union did not have to be big and bold but the process could begin now. She added that transformation must be thoughtful, gentle and calm.

Looking at what was ahead for Mothers' Union, June acknowledged that most people do not like change. She suggested that transformation must happen in a way that did not annoy stalwart members but MU could not simply revert to the way things were pre-Covid. "We have the same values, the same aims and objectives but we have (no matter how much we may deny it) been transformed by the Covid experience and we need to think about the road

before us and how to walk it – no running allowed!" she said.

which offer a framework for discussions in branches. They help members to look at what they used to do; what they have done in the face of Covid; and what they will do in the future.

"So as we move into 2022, we must not seem to be looking to the past – we must accept where we are now and look to the future. Christ must be seen in us as we transform – ourselves and Mothers' Union, with God's help," June commented. "We have to transform ourselves before we can transform others... and also before we can transform Mothers' Union – let us take those first baby steps soon, having confidence that our God – the Lord and Father of Mankind – is with us every step of the way."

Russian Orthodox Church 'encouraged' Putin to invade Ukraine, says Bishop of Leeds

The Bishop of Leeds, Nick Baines, says nobody should be shocked that Russia has invaded Ukraine. In fact, he Church News Ireland Page 10

said, the Russian Orthodox Church had encouraged President Vladimir Putin's actions.

It was quite clear, he said, that Putin was "going all out" for the whole of Ukraine and that he did not listen to words, but strong action.

In an interview for the 2nd episode of the Religion Media Centre podcast, the bishop said: "War is appalling, violence is terrible. It should be avoided at all costs. But for example, the Baltic states need to know if we mean what we say.

"Part of the reason Putin has been able to push the envelope so far over the last couple of decades, is because and this may be contentious, but I'm going to say it: Russians would still shed their blood for the Motherland. What would we shed our blood for? In the liberal West? You know, his line is you don't believe in anything."

Dr Baines, a Russian-speaker who has worked for the intelligence services, said Putin had been encouraged to keep pushing "because he knows that we 're not going to respond".

In the past 20 years, Putin had not had to invade anywhere, but according to the bishop, his biggest weapon has been to destabilise the West, which he has done with disinformation and cyber-activity.

He went on: "I think Brexit is part of that. If you want to create chaos, which is what he wants to do, all you have to do is get your opponents to form a circular firing squad. With people like Trump, Brexit, the destabilisation of the EU, he's Church News Ireland Page 11

been very successful. And he's also seen with Salisbury and the poisonings, with [Alexei] Navalny [the jailed opposition leader], and with other people, that we have big words, but we don't do much."

The current sanctions announced by the British government were "feeble", he said. And he challenged the church to put more pressure on the government to clean up "the corruption that swells through the sewers of 'Londongrad', the Russian cash ... the Russian disinformation and Boris Johnson's suppression of the Russia report".

There were different views about whether to threaten a military response or use other routes. "Having worked for the intelligence services, I take a particular view on this that some things are necessary, if not desirable," he said.

He was asked by interviewer Roger Bolton, whether the church could mediate, but he believed back channels were closed. The Russian Orthodox Church, he said, had bought into the mythology, which Putin is defending and encouraging, that Russia and Ukraine belong together. Putin has described Ukraine as a fake country.

"The roots of that judgment are religious." In fact, he said, it was unequivocally true that the Russian Orthodox Church had encouraged Putin in his campaign. There was, he believed, collusion and corruption between the Russian government and the Russian Orthodox Church.

He said Britain had a moral responsibility to go out if its way to give shelter to the large number of refugees displaced by the war. "We have been party to the development of what Church News Ireland Page 12 has happened in Russia in in allowing Putin to get as far as he has, with his threats and now his actions."

WCC urges Patriarch of Moscow to raise his voice against war

In a letter to Patriarch Kirill of Moscow this week, World Council of Churches acting general secretary Rev Prof Dr Ioan Sauca asked the patriarch to mediate so that the war between Russian and Ukraine can be stopped.

De Sauca wrote:

Your Holiness, It is with great pain and with a breaking heart that I am writing to Your Holiness. The tragic situation of the war in Ukraine has brought tremendous suffering and loss of lives. Many of our brothers and sisters had to leave their homes-including the elderly, women, and children-to save their lives.

The whole world is looking with concern and expects to see a sign of hope for a peaceful solution. I receive letters every day from different parts of the world, from church leaders and the faithful of our WCC constituency asking to approach Your Holiness to mediate so that the war can be stopped and the great suffering ended. In these times of hopelessness, many look at you asthe one who could bring a sign of hope for a peaceful solution.

I write to Your Holiness as acting general secretary of the WCC but also as an Orthodox priest. Please, raise up your voice and speak on behalf of the suffering brothers and

sisters, most of whom are also faithful members of our Orthodox Church.

Western Christians celebrate today Ash Wednesday, the day of repentance as the beginning of Lent; likewise, we, as Orthodox, will celebrate this coming Sunday the "Sunday of Forgiveness" to mark our beginning of Lent next Monday. These powerful moments in our liturgical calendars call us to repentance, peace and reconciliation. While celebrating these spiritual moments, with filial respect and consideration, I write to Your Holiness to intervene and mediate with the authorities to stop this war, the bloodshed and the suffering, and to make efforts to bring peace through dialogue and negotiations.

Building on the commitment of the St Andrew Declaration, this will be the start of a process of discussion within and between both denominations where we seek to learn from what TryTank is doing within The Episcopal Church and ask ourselves what a similar process might look like for us in Scotland.

facilitating the development of leadership and ministry by those under 40.

As the workshops will be interactive, it will not be suitable for livestreaming. It will only be possible to attend in-person in Edinburgh. It is possible that a recording of Rev Lebrija's input will be made available after the event.

WCC renews call for release of Syrian archbishops



World Council of Churches acting general secretary Rev Prof Dr Ioan Sauca reiterated calls for the release of two Syrian archbishops, Syriac Orthodox Archbishop Yohanna Ibrahim and Greek Orthodox Archbishop Paul Yazigi, who were kidnapped near Aleppo, Syria in April 2013.

Today, we mark 3,224 days since archbishops were abducted on their way back from the Turkish border to their city of Aleppo," said Sauca on 28 February.

"Day after day, we have prayed and we will continue to pray for safe return of the archbishops to their churches, their communities and their families," said Sauca. "We stand in solidarity with all the Christians of Syria and the region."

The calls for the release of the archbishops come amid grave concern regarding the alarming and rapidly deteriorating situation of Christians in the Middle East.
