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Archbishop Eamon Martin pays tribute to journalists who gave their lives in the search of the truth

To mark World Communications Day which was celebrated today – the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Archbishop Eamon Martin has released a video presentation of Pope Francis' message. Pope Francis has chosen to reflect on the theme "'Come and See'(Jn 1:46). Communicating by Encountering People Where and as They Are."

This theme recalls the Gospel account of the first disciples' initial encounters with Jesus, who invited them to "Come and see," to enter into relationship with Him. Later, one of those disciples, Saint Philip, speaking to his friend Nathaniel, invited him to "Come and see" the Messiah whom he had found.

Please see below the text of Archbishop Eamon Martin's brief video welcoming Pope Francis' message for WCD2021:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In the world of communications nothing beats seeing things in person – through first-hand experience.



For World Communications Day this year, Pope Francis reflects on those words, "Come and See" – words which Jesus himself sometimes used to people who were curious to find out more about him.

Good media and journalism likewise invites us to "Come and See". The internet for example brings to our doorsteps events that are happening all over the world and enables us to share them with others.

Of course there is also the risk of misinformation and fake news. All the more reason, then, for people us to be responsible and authentic online and to be witnesses of the truth.

Pope Francis acknowledges in his message the courage and commitment of journalists and other media professionals who often risk their lives helping us to learn the reality of life around the world today.

They beam onto our mobile devices and into our living rooms the hardships facing countless people around the world, like persecution, oppression, poverty, war and injustice.

In recent times, they have helped us to see first-hand the way that the Covid19 pandemic has been impacting people not just here at home but also in the poverty-stricken villages of Asia, Latin America and Africa. I'm conscious today of the work of brave journalists here in Ireland like Lyra McKee, Veronica Guerin, and Martin O'Hagan who risked and lost their lives while seeking to uncover and report the truth.

I think also of the two Spanish journalists who were killed last month in Burkina Faso along with the Irish conservationist, Rory Young.

Pope Francis reminds us today how the Good News of the Gospel has spread down the centuries through person-to-person, heart-to-heart encounters.

Every media tool has its value in handing on the faith, but what really impresses others is a personal witness to faith, hope and charity.

That is the challenge that faces all of us – to communicate our love for Jesus by encountering others, where they are and as they are, and inviting them to "Come and See".

God bless you in this mission, and may truth guide all those who are working in media and journalism here in Ireland.



Christ Church Cathedral reopening Trinity Sunday

Christ Church Dublin will be welcoming its congregation back into the cathedral on Sunday, 30 May, Trinity Sunday, for its patronal festival. The guest preacher for the service will be The Revd Dr Sahr Yambasu, President Designate of the Methodist Church in Ireland.

There is space for a maximum of 46 persons in the congregation. Services will continue to be streamed via the cathedral's webcam for those unable to be present with in person.

If you would like to attend the 11.00 Eucharist on Trinity Sunday, please email rsvp@christchurch.ie and indicate how many places you require by 21 May. In the event that

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the service is oversubscribed, places will be allocated by lottery.

All who express interest in attending on Trinity Sunday will receive confirmation by Wednesday, 26 May, as to whether or not a place is available.

New chaplain at Lambeth

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has appointed the Revd Tosin Oladipo as his new chaplain.

Tosin, who is currently a parish priest in East London, will serve as chaplain to Archbishop Justin and the Lambeth Palace community. He will also have responsibility for

developing Archbishop Justin's priority of prayer and the Religious life, particularly through the Community of St Anselm. He will begin the role at the start of July.

Tosin takes over from the Revd Prebendary Dr Isabelle Hamley, who in November last year was appointed Secretary for Ecumenical Relations and Theology at the Church of England's Council for Christian Unity, and Theological Adviser to the House of Bishops. The Revd Cortland Fransella has served as Acting Chaplain to the Archbishop since then.

For the last three years, Tosin has served as part of the leadership team at SAINT, a resource church in East London, with specific responsibility for outreach, prayer, and the development of interns and ordinands. He has overseen community engagement and the revitalisation of St Mary's Leyton, as part of a partnership between Chelmsford and London dioceses. He has also been responsible for the work of the Lighthouse project, which has distributed over 300,000 meals to those in need since the start of the pandemic.

Alongside this, Tosin has led the prayer life of the church, which in the last year has included developing a digital 'Rule of Life': a creative and liturgical space to help sustain its community through the pandemic.

Before training for ministry, Tosin worked for 15 years in digital and video tech start-ups. He is married to Angela, a mental health professional.

Archbishop Justin said: "I am delighted that Tosin will be joining the Lambeth Palace community. The chaplain at Lambeth ensures that prayer and worship underpin everything we do, and that our gaze remains fixed on Jesus Christ. I am grateful that Tosin will be bringing his immense pastoral skills, passion for the Gospel and dedication to prayer to the senior team at Lambeth, and I look forward to working alongside him enormously. My prayers are with Tosin and Angela as they say goodbye to their community in East London and prepare to join us at Lambeth."

The Revd Tosin Oladipo said: "It will be a great privilege and an exciting challenge to serve as Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury - to pray for him and his family and to help deliver his priority for Prayer and Religious life. I look forward to joining the amazing community and working with the brilliant team at Lambeth Palace. Angela and I have loved our time in East London as part of SAINT. We will miss the team and all the incredible people we have come to know in Hackney and Leyton. Please pray for us as we enter this new chapter."

Speaking to the Soul - The Power of a Story

A Reading from the Gospel of Matthew 13:24-34a

24 He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; 25 but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. 26 So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. 27 And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' 28He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' 29But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. 30Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

31 He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; 32 it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

33 He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened." 34 Jesus told the crowds all these things in parables; without a parable he told them nothing.

Meditation

There's something about the power of a story — the way it engages our hearts and minds, stirs our imaginations. Story touches our emotions and deepens our connection with meaningful truths. It broadens our horizons. It helps us make sense of our own experiences and better understand others'.

A good story can be a far more effective way to get an important message across, than any preaching or teaching, any lecture or pitch or diatribe. It's true!

Maybe that's why — according to the gospels — Jesus always taught in parables, simple stories that reveal profound spiritual truths. Stories that stay with us long after we've first heard them. Stories that speak to us on different levels and in different ways, in different seasons of our lives. Stories that help us live out our own stories authentically and intentionally, and find our part, our place, in the Greatest Story Ever Told.

As you reflect on the parables that Jesus taught, which one most speaks to you or most resonates with you right now? Which one raises questions you might need to consider?

Think about a truth you've discovered that's been lifechanging for you, something that God has shown you, some wisdom you've acquired, or something worthwhile that you'd <u>churchnewsireland@gmail.org</u> Page 21 like to pass on to others. What's the story behind it? How did you come to this knowledge, this revelation? Or what's a great way to illustrate it, to understand it, and remember it?

Who can you share your story with today?
