Archbishop Martin celebrates mass tonight with the sisters of Mother Teresa

Archbishop Eamon Martin, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, yesterday welcomed the news that Pope Francis has announced that Blessed Mother Teresa of Calcutta will be canonised a saint on Sunday 4 September.

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Archbishop Eamon said, "It is wonderful news that Pope Francis has signed the decree for canonisation today, and that from September the Universal Church will formally acknowledge Blessed Mother Teresa as one amongst the communion of saints. Blessed Mother Teresa is much loved in Ireland having been a frequent visitor to our country during her lifetime. At the age of eighteen, she came to study English and begin her life as a nun with the Loreto Sisters of Dublin. In this Year of Mercy, I am especially conscious and express my profound gratitude to the Missionaries of Charity, the religious congregation founded by Blessed Mother Teresa. for their selfless outreach and ministry serving the homeless and hungry here in the Archdiocese of Armagh.

"I will celebrate Mass tomorrow evening at 7.30pm, on the vigil of our patron Saint Patrick, in Saint Malachy's Church, Armagh, for Blessed Mother Teresa and for the four sisters of the Missionary of Charity – Sisters Anselm, Margherite, Reginette and Judith – and the twelve people, who were brutally murdered in a home for the elderly in Aden, Yemen, on 4 March. Their faith, life and death provide a very strong witness to all Christians at this time."

Archbishop Eamon concluded, "Tomorrow's Mass in Saint Malachy's will be attended by sisters of the Missionaries of Charity living locally, and will be offered for the intentions of the 4,500 worldwide members of the congregation. All are welcome."

The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, Rt. Rev. Dr. Ian McNie has expressed his condolences to the family of Adrian Ismay, on hearing the news that the prison officer and father of three injured in a car bomb explosion 12 days ago, died yesterday.

"This is devastating news for Mr. Ismay's family. In offering my deepest sympathy and condolences to them, I pray that they would know God's love and comfort at this intensely difficult time."

The Rt Revd Harold Miller, Bishop of Down and Dromore, and Chair of the Church of Ireland Northern Ireland Community Relations Working Group said, 'I am deeply saddened by the death of Prison Officer Adrian Ismay and wish to express my sincere and heartfelt condolences to his family. I pray that they would be deeply aware of God's grace, consolation and blessing, and ask for continued support for them in prayer in the days that lie ahead. "The attack on Prison Officer Ismay was a deplorable and terrible act. I commend all those who serve in the Northern Ireland Prison Service on behalf of our community. They deserve our fullest support."

Belvoir parishioner volunteer's experience at refugee camp in Serbia


David Maganda from Belvoir Parish, Belfast, has recently returned from 4 weeks volunteering alongside an Operation Mobilisation (OM) team in Sid (Serbia). Since November 2015 the team has been based on the Serbian/Croatian border, working with refugees fleeing from Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan. As David speaks Arabic, he was requested by OM to come and help with translation as they offer food, clothing and emotional and spiritual assistance to hundreds of mainly Syrian refugees.

Thousands of refugees pass through the camp each day. The trip from their country normally takes about a month or more, so when they arrive they are weary, hungry, sick, dirty, and despairing. Once in Sid, they board a train that will take them into Croatia, and then pass into Slovenia and Austria, and eventually on to Germany. This is one of five routes that refugees are taking into Germany right now...

...One family that David met had travelled all the way from Homs in Syria. He asked them why they had risked their lives to cross over the water from Turkey to Greece when many of them couldn't even swim. The father, Nazir, told David that he had been tortured by the Syrian security and army. While he was speaking, his wife was quietly crying. He told David that he'd rather risk his life and those of his family on a boat, than die at the hands of ISIS or the Syrian army. They lost many people on the way – but all were determined to flee the tyranny of the Syrian regime. The refugees are traumatized, exhausted and desperate to find respite from their arduous journey. Many are frightened and scared of where they are going and often they think life in Europe will be like going to heaven. They have escaped and don't want to look back. David was able to share his life story of how he lived as a refugee in Sudan in the early 80s. This helped people to open up and share their hopes and fears with him. He was also able to give them a realistic view of what it's like to live in Europe, encouraging them to integrate and get fully involved in the life of the community where they will eventually settle.

"As I reflect back on my month in Serbia, says David, "there are many stories I cannot share and I've struggled to get my head round them. Please continue praying for our governments to have compassion and that the Church will demonstrate the love and grace of God to those who land on their doorsteps."

David is hoping to go back in April to help out with the team, as they are in desperate need of mature volunteers (over the age of 20) in Serbia who can cook, clean, listen and play with kids. The need is great.

George was an extremely talented musician with a wide repertoire. He trained and prepared choirs, led praise groups, accompanied soloists and Sunday School children, all with skill, sensitivity and feeling.

In all the outstanding service he gave to Knocknamuckley, George consistently kept himself in the background. Seeking no praise or recognition, he was content to serve God and the people of the church of which he was a lifelong member. George was always reliable, approachable, flexible and co-operative and was a pleasure to work with over the years. He made an immense contribution, not only to the life of the Church but also to individuals and families going through important times in their lives. His music on such occasions was an uplifting source of comfort and strength to those who needed it and when occasions demanded it, a means of joy and celebration. Many have expressed their admiration and gratitude for what his music meant to them at such times.

Welsh churches to mark Earth Hour

Churches across Wales are being urged to switch off all lights or hold candlelit vigils to mark Earth Hour at 8.30 pm on Saturday 19 March. In doing so, they will join in with people across the world in what has been described as "a symbolic act to shine a light on climate change and the need to protect our environment."

An estimated half-a-million people across Wales took part in the 2015 Earth Hour, and half of Welsh local authorities supported the campaign. <u>churchnewsireland@gmail.com</u> Page 14 Key landmarks across the country, such as the Senedd, Caerphilly Castle and Welsh universities and churches went dark for the hour.

They joined the international landmarks such as the Eiffel Tour and Sydney Opera House in 172 participating countries across the globe.

Earth Hour is organised by the WWF charity and this year marks its 10th year. Participating churches are being asked to register their involvement and add themselves to the online Earth Hour map.

The first to register is St Peter's Church in Carmarthen town centre.

"We're encouraging all churches and parishioners to mark Earth Hour," the Bishop of Swansea and Brecon, the Rt Revd John Davies, said. The bishop, who speaks on behalf of the Church in Wales' environment group, CHASE (Church Action for Sustaining the Environment), added: "Switching off our lights for an hour or holding a candlelit service is a small gesture which has huge implications. It reminds us of the part all of us have to play in combating climate change and being responsible stewards of the wonderful gift that is creation." Anne Meikle, thehead of WWF in Wales, said, "Earth Hour won't solve climate change, but it presents a stepping stone to further action, by encouraging people to go beyond the hour.

"Churches can play a vital role in raising awareness of Earth Hour, engaging with your community and inspiring others to live sustainably."
