UK's biggest Boys' Brigade battalion parade in Belfast

Members of the UK's biggest Boys' Brigade battalion paraded through the centre of Belfast on Sunday. The youngsters belong to the roughly 6,000-strong Belfast Battalion (which actually includes members from north Down, Lisburn and Newtownabbey), and were attending their annual church service in the Royal Belfast Academical Institution in the city centre, before marching past the City Hall at about accompanied by bugle, flute and pipe bands.

Archbishop Eamon Martin pleads for information on the Disappeared

The leader of the Catholic church in Ireland has issued a plea for information about the Disappeared during an annual mass for them.

Though the remains of 12 of those kidnapped, killed and secretly buried by republicans during the Troubles, a number of such remains have yet to be found.

Archbishop Eamon Martin said: "I appeal to the conscience of anyone who has information that might help find the others to come forward to the Independent Commission for the Location of Victims' Remains, so that, even at this late stage, the remaining families can experience the consolation of being able to offer a Christian burial to their loved ones."

To date, the ICVLR, an independent body set up during the peace process, has recovered the remains of 12 people.

Last year two men -- Kevin McKee, 17, and 25year-old Seamus Wright - were found in a shallow grave near Coghalstown in Co Meath last September.

They were discovered during searches for Cistercian monk Joe Lynskey who was snatched from West Belfast in 1972, just a few miles from where the body of Brendan Megraw was dug up at Oristown, Co Meath a year earlier.

To date, the searches for Mr Lynskey have been unsuccessful.

Seamus Ruddy who disappeared from Paris in 1985; Columba McVeigh who was abducted in Dublin in 1975 and SAS-trained Captain Robert Nairac who disappeared from a South Armagh pub in 1977, also remain missing.

The Archbishop was addressing an annual mass for the Disappeared in St Patrick's College, Armagh.

He added: "Over the past 17 years the families of those abducted, murdered and secretly buried have gathered to comfort one another and a close bond of empathy has developed among them.

"It is particularly merciful that many of those who have already had the comfort of bringing home for burial the bodies of their loved ones, continue to gathered in support of the remaining families who still wait in hope.

"The recovery and dignified laying to rest of of Kevin McKee and Seamus Wright since our gathering last Holy Week encourages us to continue to pray and not lose hope."

Bible-reading Marathon underway in Raphoe Cathedral

The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Ken Good, has launched a four-day Bible-reading Marathon in St Eunan's Cathedral, Raphoe. The entire bible will be read non-stop, day and night, from beginning to end by parishioners and members of the wider community. The event has been organised as part of the Cathedral's contribution to the Diocese of Derry and Raphoe's 'Year of Opportunity 2016'.

People have been invited to come and read from the bible in 30-minute sections between 8 pm on Palm Sunday and 8 pm on Maundy Thursday, the 24th of March. There are 192 half-hour sessions over the four days of the event.

Bishop Good performed the first reading – Genesis chapters 1 to 7 – and was followed by the Roman Catholic Bishop of Raphoe, Dr Philip Boyce, who read chapters 8 to 14. The first layperson to perform a reading was Cathedral parishioner Rosemary Meehan.

The Dean of Raphoe, the Very Rev. Arthur Barrett, says it is an event for the whole community and an opportunity for everyone to join together in reading God's Word in the historic setting of St Eunan's Church of Ireland Cathedral. "The Bible Reading Marathon is a significant event during the Diocesan Year of Opportunity 2016," the Dean says. "Our desire is to encourage and welcome as many people as possible from across the whole community to share in our unity of God's Word."

Good Friday Walks of Witness in Lisburn and Derry

A Good Friday Walk of Witness will take place in Lisburn as the churches of the city reflect on the story of the cross.

The Walk begins at 1pm outside Cafe Nero on Bow Street to walk to Market Square for a service.

Easter Sunday is a celebration of the 40 Days of Prayer in Lisburn city. A total of 18 churches have shared in these 40 days of prayer. Christians will journey from their morning church services to Market Square for a 1pm start which will include worship, testimony, prayer and some food.

Leaders of the four main Christian churches in Derry-Londonderry will lead a cross-community 'Walk of Witness' through the city centre on Good Friday to commemorate Christ's crucifixion and death at Golgotha.

The event presents an opportunity for participants to present a united Christian Witness. Instead of highlighting our differences, it illuminates our common faith in the saving power of Jesus Christ through the Cross.

The 'Walk of Witness' will begin at 12.00 noon on Good Friday at St Columb's Hall. It will proceed to Guildhall Square, passing through the Richmond Centre (which has kindly agreed to facilitate the event) and down Shipquay Street.

The event will include readings from Scripture and hymn-singing, and all are welcome.

Irish Pilgrim Paths Festival begins

Thousands of people from all over Ireland will take part in this year's Pilgrim Paths Festival which commences today and will be a weeklong event for the first time.


Easter Saturday 2014 was designated as the very first National Pilgrim Paths Day.

The event proved a huge success with almost 1,800 participants taking part at 11 pilgrim path locations across Ireland.

Following on this success, the second annual National Pilgrim Paths Day took place on Easter Saturday, 4 April 2015, with a nationwide series of walks planned along the country's major medieval penitential walkways.

Now in 2016, the Pilgrim Paths Festival has been extended to a week-long celebration running from Tuesday 22 March to Tuesday 29 March.

Speaking on local radio, Pilgrim Paths Ireland chairman and author of 'Pilgrim Paths in Ireland', John G O'Dwyer said that there has been "a remarkable renewal of interest in following in the footsteps of the past".



"National Pilgrim Paths Week offers all comers from every religious background and none an opportunity to reconnect with Ireland's medieval heritage," he said.

"The event is targeted, not only at those who enjoy exploring and learning more about the history of our ancient tracks, but also the growing number of people seeking to escape the daily grind of life and take some time out for reflection while enjoying the great outdoors."

The event is also been supported by the Heritage Council. In a statement, it said that it "is delighted to see local groups engage so strongly with Ireland's pilgrim paths".

The Heritage Council added, "Working with the local communities, the project aimed to raise awareness of the different aspects of heritage,

built and natural, encountered along the routes, while contributing to sustainable tourism and community development in each local area."

During Pilgrim Paths week events will take place on each of Ireland's 13 medieval pilgrim paths.

These include Glen Colm Cille in Co Donegal, Slí Mor in Co Offaly, Tochar Phadraig in Co Mayo, St Kevin's Way in Co Wicklow, St Bridget Pilgrim Path in Kildare, Kilcommon National Pilgrim Loop in Co Tipperary, Rath/Dysert Pilgrim Path in Co Clare, Cosán na Naomh and Cnoc na dTobar in Co Kerry, St Finbarr's Pilgrim Path in Co Cork, St Declan's Way in Co Waterford and the Pilgrim Path of St Brigid in Kildare.

Rector appointed to Holmpatrick Group

The Revd Anthony Kelly has been appointed Rector of the Holmpatrick Group of Parishes in the Diocese of Dublin. Anthony has been Bishop's Curate in the group, which comprises Holmpatrick, Skerries and Kenure, Rush with St George's Balbriggan, since the Feast of St Brigid, February 1, 2012.

Since his arrival four years ago, the long-term aim of the parishes was to regain incumbency status. To this end parishioners worked towards a parish Vision Day in October 2013, where they collectively articulated a future vision for their parishes. Together they set about implementing that vision, which they hoped would lead to a renewal and a revitalisation of parish life and chart a path into the future, always having consideration for the call of Jesus to build the Kingdom of God on earth.

"It is great news for all our parishioners to hear that the incumbency status of the Holmpatrick Group of Parishes has been restored. Their collaborative work has indeed born fruit, as we have endeavoured to move away from a priest–centred model of church to an every–member model of ministry," Anthony commented following the announcement of his appointment this morning (Sunday March 20).

"I too am delighted and humbled to be appointed Rector. Together we look forward to a bright and grace-filled future as part of 'qahal Yahweh' – the assembly of God, as the Hebrew

scriptures referred to the gathered people of God in the Old Testament," he added.
