Holy Week "Impact" in Castlederg

'Impact Castlederg' – a seven-day initiative for Holy Week – is underway in the Derg Valley in West Tyrone.

It has been organised by various local churches and aims to "show God's love in Jesus through words and deeds".

The Rector of Derg and Termonamongan, Rev Peter Ferguson, says various local churches are working together on the initiative. He says his own parish has got involved as part of its contribution to Year of Opportunity 2016.

As part of the week-long event, a Prayer Room was opened in the Diamond. It was open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., up until Good Friday evening. There was a street 'give-away' on Wednesday afternoon; a 'Movie with a Message' was shown at tea-time on Wednesday; an Easter Praise Party was held for children on Holy Thursday morning; and there will be an Easter Praise Picnic in Castle Grounds on Sunday afternoon.

Rev Ferguson says many of the other churches in the area have got involved, with Children's Ministry leaders from various churches working together for the 'Kidz Praise Party' and the Praise Picnic.

Dublin nun honoured for work in East Africa

A Dublin nun - one of Ireland's longest serving missionaries - has been honoured for work in Uganda. When Sr Cosmas Cullen left Ireland for East Africa in 1949 she thought she would never see her family or homeland again.

Sr Cosmas (90), originally from Churchtown, Dublin, was honoured for her many years of dedicated work in Uganda at the annual St Patrick's Ball in the Sheraton Hotel in Kampala.

Sr Cosmas lived through often turbulent periods and pupils in her school included two daughters of the dictator Idi Amin.

But she said that the challenges were many throughout her time.

"Children returned to school and life gradually became more normal," she said. "But of course we had new challenges, particularly the HIV



scourge, which saw so many of our children being left orphans."

In recent years, Sr Cosmas has been helping destitute young people prepare for their O and A level exams at the Sharing Youth Centre in Kampala. She was also helping in two nursery schools until she was diagnosed with breast cancer last August.

Irish Ambassador to Uganda Donal Cronin said Sr Cosmas deserved to be honoured.

"Like the other Irish missionaries here over the years, she clearly imbued a deep sense of education and thirst for knowledge in who ever she taught."

Precious Life online petition to stop eugenic discrimination of Down's babies

A leading Pro Life agency, Precious Life, has appealed to members of the public to support an online petition not to discriminate against people on the basis of their genetic predisposition.

The petition calls on the Secretary General of the UN, the Commissioner for Human Rights from the Council of Europe and the European Commissioner for the Charter of Fundamental Rights to appeal to member states to use genetic testing solely to enhance human care and well-being of babies.

"Many countries are on the brink of expanding national prenatal screening programmes with a new generation of genetics tests aimed at detecting Down Syndrome," says Stop Descriminating Down.

21 March was World Down's Syndrome Day, a day highlighting to the world the talents and power of people with Down's syndrome, but according to the lobby group it has also become a day in which "we need to acknowledge the basic right to exist of people with Down's syndrome".

"The pharmaceutical industry is continuing to perfect its screening methods to detect Down's syndrome in utero. Non invasive prenatal testing (NIPT) can identify Down's syndrome in an unborn child by testing the mother's blood, and it is spreading quickly across the world. Increasingly, governments (including France, the UK and the Netherlands) are preparing to introduce NIPT into their public healthcare programmes as part of standard prenatal care," it says.

Abortion rates for babies with Down's Syndrome following prenatal diagnosis is already over 90% in France, the UK and the Netherlands.

The group, which is supported by seventeen pro life agencies, including Northern Ireland's Precious Life, says no-one should have to

defend threats to their life because of his or her genetic make-up.

Jo Bailey Wells, C of E priest with U.S. ties, appointed bishop of Dorking

The Archbishop of Canterbury's chaplain, the Rev. Canon Jo Bailey Wells, was named March 24 to be the fifth bishop of Dorking in the Church of England's <u>Diocese of Guildford</u>.

Wells, 50, studied at the University of Minnesota and from 2005 to 2013 was the director of the Anglican Episcopal House of Studies at Duke Divinity School in North Carolina. She was also associate professor of Bible and ministry at Duke.

She will succeed Bishop Ian Brackley who retired in the autumn. The bishop of Dorking is the suffragan bishop for the Diocese of Guildford. The bishop of Dorking assists the bishop of Guildford in leading the diocese, according to the churchnewsireland@gmail.com



Diocese of Guildford's <u>announcement</u>. Wells' particular brief includes nurturing vocations and working with the many schools and colleges in the diocese.

She was educated at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, before going to Minnesota, according to an <u>announcement</u> by the office of the United Kingdom's prime minister. Her appointment was confirmed by Queen Elizabeth II, the announcement said.

Wells trained for ordained ministry at St. John's College, Durham, and was ordained in 1995 in the first wave of female priests in the Church of

England, according to the Guildford press release.

She was chaplain of Clare College, Cambridge from 1995 to 1998 and dean from 1998 to 2001. From 2001 to 2005, Wells served as a lecturer in Old Testament and biblical theology at Ridley Hall, Cambridge. From there she moved to Duke. On her return to the U.K. in 2013 she took up the role of chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury, based at Lambeth Palace in London. Since 2015 she has also served as canon theologian at Liverpool Cathedral.

Her first day as chaplain involved carrying the primatial cross at the enthronement of Archbishop Justin Welby with a congregation of 2,000 in Canterbury Cathedral and an estimated audience of 20 million worldwide, the Guildford announcement said. She has accompanied Welby at events such as the re-burial of Richard III and the baptisms of Prince George and Princess Charlotte – as well as the recent gathering of Anglican primates.

Wells is married to the Rev. Sam Wells, who is vicar of St. Martin-in-the-Fields in London. They have two children. Her interests include art,

architecture and textiles. She has spent a significant portion of her annual leave over many years in East Africa, most recently in supporting Archbishop Daniel Deng Bul in theological education in the Episcopal Church of South Sudan and Sudan.

Churches in Wales unite to safeguard children

The Church in Wales has joined with other Christian denominations in the country as well as expert and survivor organisations in a new forum to safeguard children and vulnerable adults and to ensure that all churches in Wales are safe places for them.

The Welsh Christian Safeguarding Forum brings together the safeguarding officers from churches throughout Wales and has been established to share and develop best practice and to give Christian organisations a stronger voice on safeguarding issues in Wales.

In addition to the churches' safeguarding officers, the forum includes representatives from the group Minister and Clergy Sexual Abuse Survivors (MASCAS), as well as the Churches Child Protection Advisory Service (CCPAS). A

"The Church in Wales is doing all it can to ensure churches are safe places for children and all vulnerable people and we welcome the Forum as a chance to strengthen our work and share good practice with other denominations – particularly in how we respond to survivors of abuse," the Church in Wales' head of safeguarding, Elaine Cloke, said, "All the safeguarding officers have shown enthusiasm and commitment to the Forum and we all hope it will give us a stronger voice to lobby the Welsh Government on those areas of safeguarding

which are devolved – the quantity and complexity of which have increased rapidly over the past few years."

In order to ensure it is fully representative of Christians in Wales, the Forum has begun an engagement project with Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) churches and communities throughout the country. It is also seeking to develop strong links with the Interfaith Council for Wales, the Welsh Assembly Cross Party Working Group on Faith and, in a wider UK context, with the Churches Forum for Safeguarding.
