SDLP and Sinn Fein 'alienating devout Catholics'

The SDLP and Sinn Fein are increasingly alienating devoutly Catholic voters, the editor of a major Catholic newspaper has said.

Writing in The Irish Catholic, the paper's editor, Michael Kelly, said that some of the five per cent drop in the nationalist vote last week can be explained by the swing to People Before Profit in West Belfast and Foyle.

But he argued that the loss of votes to the socialist party was "only part of the explanation".

He went on: "One explanation I hear when I speak to Catholics who are serious about their faith is a disillusionment with both Sinn Féin and the SDLP when it comes to vital social issues.

"Sinn Féin is enthusiastically pushing for the introduction of abortion in the North, while the SDLP has made the introduction of same-sex marriage a core party principle.

"There is simply nowhere for Catholics who are serious about the defence of marriage and the right to life of the vulnerable to go."

He added: "The SDLP is desperate to attract a younger demographic. And it appears that many of the party's current stances are motivated by a

desire to appear 'with it' when it comes to younger voters.

"But, the reality is that the party often appears like a less-radical version of Sinn Féin or as one now-alienated SDLP voter recently described his former party to me: 'Sinn Féin-lite'."

Urban Saints' overseas mission

A group of Urban Saints from Tullylish and Gilford will fly out to South Africa on July 8 to build new homes for the deprived as part of a ReBuild project.

Banbridge Leader - Formerly called the Crusaders until 2007, Urban Saints is an interdenominational Christian Youth Organisation and the team from Tullylish Church of Ireland, Tullylish Presbyterian and Gilford Church of Ireland have been hard at work organising a Car Boot Sale fundraiser on May 28, for their trip.

Chloe Moffatt, who is travelling with the group said: "We will be joining up with other teams from Ireland and England to build a home for a family living in a township.

"Professional builders will lay the foundations but after that we'll be building the rest. We're there for 10 days and at the end we get to hand the keys over to the family.

"While we're there it attracts a lot of kids from the area, so we'll also be running kids clubs and we'll visit an orphanage and an HIV centre."

The Tullylish and Gilford group of Urban Saints was formed around 20 years ago and 20 young people now meet each Sunday night. Of them,

eight will be participating in the South African ReBuild project.

"This is the first time our group has done something like this and for a lot of them it is their first mission trip, so everything is very exciting.

"We're also the first group from Northern Ireland to do a rebuild project, so they are very excited to have us. As we know each other well, we'll be able to support each other."

The Car Boot Sale will take place at Gilford Bowling Green on Saturday, May 28, from 9am - 12 noon and at £5 per car or £10 per van the young people are encouraging everyone to come and support them.

NI Assembly election results endorse pro life ethos, claim

The Pro Life group, Precious Life, has said that the Northern Ireland Assembly election results are an endorsement of pro life parties.

Prior to the 5 May vote, Precious Life launched its 'Your Vote Matters' campaign, appealing to voters to vote pro life and distributing over 100,000 leaflets to homes, churches, and in city centres throughout the six counties.



Their website contained a comprehensive list of all the candidates in the election and where they stood on abortion.

The Democratic Unionist Party (DUP), Social and Democratic and Labour Party, roughly half the members of the Ulster Unionist Party and some Independents all said they were against abortion.

Sinn Féin, the Alliance Party, the Greens and People Before Profit support greater access to abortion.

The elections, the fifth since the devolved assembly was established in 1998, saw the Democratic Unionist Party (DUP) win 38 seats, Sinn Féin (SF) – 28, Ulster Unionist Party (UUP) –

16, Social Democratic and Labour Party (SDLP)12, and the Alliance 8.

The Greens and People Before Profit won two seats each and Traditional Unionist Voice, one seat. The turnout was almost 60%.

Fifty nine of the 108 candidates elected oppose abortion (SDLP, DUP, 8 UUP Members of the Legislative Assembly and the TUV).

Reacting to the Assembly Election results, Bernadette Smyth, the director of Precious Life congratulated the newly elected Members of the Northern Ireland Assembly who had vowed to defend the right to life of all unborn children at Stormont.

"The DUP and SDLP have publicly made clear that they are pro-life parties," she said.

"Precious Life are very hopeful that they will stand strong in their opposition to the plans of Sinn Féin and others to bring forward legislation to allow abortion in cases where an unborn child has been diagnosed with a life-limiting disability. We trust that they will not let their voters down."

She appealed to the electorate to keep the pressure on political representatives to "ensure that they do not renege on their pro-life

promises," and invited the public to attend the 10th Annual All-Ireland *Rally for Life* in Belfast on 2 July 2016.

Precious Life, founded by Bernadette Smyth in 1997, is the largest pro-life group in Northern Ireland.

Composed of people from all sections of the community, it is non-denominational and non-party political.

The group believes that the dramatic drop in the numbers of women travelling from Northern Ireland to England for abortion is in part at least attributable to its activism, including the work it does on the streets.

Sabina Higgins criticised over abortion comments

A group representing parents with children diagnosed with life limiting conditions, along with other pro life groups, have hit back at President Michael D Higgins' wife over her comments on abortion.

Speaking after a debate organised by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland in Trinity College last week, Sabina Higgins said it was "outrage" against women that in the case of "foetal abnormality", a person should be "made carry" the baby to term.

"There has to be the choice that you know that, what do you call it, that foetal abnormality, that the person or persons should be made carry, you know, and sit in, you know. These are really outrages against women and outrages against the world and nature," Mrs Higgins said.

In a statement posted on its Facebook page, the group EveryLifeCounts responded by saying it was sad to see Sabina Higgins "push abortion for babies like ours because of their severe disability".

The statement continued, "Their lives were short but they mattered and they had value. And surely the President's wife should know that there is no such medical diagnosis as a 'fatal, foetal abnormality'. She should withdraw her remarks and apologise for the hurt caused."

Sabina Higgins' abortion call an abuse of privilege and a shameful targeting of babies with disabilities

The Life Institute accused the President's wife of an "attack on the Constitutional right to life of

unborn babies" and said it was "an absolute abuse of power and privilege".

Spokeswoman Niamh Uí Bhriain said Ms Higgins' comments, targeting unborn babies with a disability, were particularly offensive to families who had lost a child to a life-limiting condition.

"The President's wife is unelected but uses the platform of the supposedly non-political office of her husband to amplify her support for abortion," said Niamh Uí Bhriain.

"The fact that she has targeted babies with a disability to justify an abortion call is, in my view, reprehensible. It is shameful to see Ms Higgins use the language of discrimination – misinformed and discriminatory phrases like 'fatal foetal abnormality', which are not a medical diagnosis – despite a call by parents for an end to this language and discriminatory attitudes towards unborn babies with a severe disability," she said.

"It seems that Ms Higgins is seizing the pulpit of the Presidential office to push her own agenda on the killing of unborn babies. This is unprecedented, and has ensured that the office of President is now seen as part of an abortion campaign, a move which would be opposed by the majority of Irish people," she said.

Separately, the Independent Senator Rónán Mullen described Sabina Higgins' intervention in abortion debate as "regrettable".

Last Methodist presidential letter from Rev Brian Anderson

In his last presidential letter (June *Methodist Newsletter*), before handing over the reins to Rev Bill Mullally, Rev Brian Anderson challenged readers to think of what the greatest challenges are in church life. He says that in the course of his presidential year he has visited 80 churches throughout Ireland and asked ministers and stewards about their concerns. He discerned two main threads:

Problems with getting people to take on roles – leaders are having to be recycled.

Keeping congregations together – tensions around inevitable change.

There were other challenges too *e.g.* finding the missing generation of people in their 30s and 40s, and getting people interested in prayer. Brian felt that the fundamental challenge could

be summed up by the words of one minister: 'How do I lead my congregation between agreeing what is important and what is *really* important?'

Brian concluded his letter with his belief that if church members commit to personal holiness some of the other challenges may look after themselves.

Helping evangelical Christians to accept LGBT people as equals

Jayne Ozanne is known for her passionate commitment to "good disagreement" between those who hold differing opinions within the Church, especially on sexuality issues. Speaking to members of the Church of Ireland General Synod at a fringe meeting in Dun Laoghaire last week she urged the importance of fostering "good disagreement" and mutual respect between those of opposing views on sexuality issues in the Church.

Responding to questions from the Revd Gary Dowd, she shared the story of her own struggle to reverse her same-sex attraction and her eventual realisation that it was right for her to accept her orientation. She became convinced

that she was created to relate to those around her in this way, that her calling was to help others in a similar situation and to help her fellow evangelical Christians to accept LGBT people as equals.

During the seminar Ms Ozanne shared her experience of helping Christians, particularly evangelicals, engage with this topic in the Church of England, and discussed the current debate within the Anglican Communion. She also listened carefully to both opposing and supportive views from the floor, and expressed the hope that there would be further mutually respectful discussion at every level of church life. "Learning to listen across the conservative – liberal divide is crucial," she said. "And I am so pleased that this has been mandated by the Report of the C of I's Select Committee on Human Sexuality in the Context of Christian Belief"

"The Church of Ireland is at a pivotal point in its discussions on human sexuality – which will affect the lives of hundreds of thousands. Now, more than ever, Christians need to find the courage, wisdom and grace to engage with one another in a way that honours and respects the Christ in each other. How can such differences be reconciled? Is it possible to

hold differing views in tension? What will this mean for the future of the Church?"

"This challenge offers a unique opportunity for the Church of Ireland to witness the transformative power of the Gospel, particularly in how it deals with some of the most vulnerable and marginalised in our society. For too long their voices, and their pain, have gone unheeded. The Archbishop of Canterbury himself has recently recognized this, responding during the Primates Meeting in January to a letter signed by over 100 senior Anglicans, by saying how sorry he was "for the hurt and pain both past and present that the Church has caused LGBT people".

Ms Ozanne said that, central to the debate are our differing understandings of Scripture, and how we interpret it in the light of the different cultural contexts in which the books of the Bible were written. This requires a rigorous engagement with the texts, and demands a level of honesty about some of our greatest fears and prejudices. The journey is not for the faint hearted. It demands resilience, patience and grace – but most of all it compels us to speak the truth in love to each other, whilst looking to "act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God"

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In St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, there was an organ recital by Dr Stephen Timpany, the cathedral's director of music. His programme included works by JS Bach, John Stanley, Walton and Elgar.

News briefs

Tomorrow, Tuesday, the Bishop of Cork will preach at a service to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the consecration of St Lappan's Church, Little Island. The building of St Lappan's Church was part of an extensive church-building programme in Cork, Cloyne & Ross which was driven by John Gregg who had been appointed bishop in 1862. A leading member of the evangelical movement, Grego was, on his appointment to Cork, the first Irishspeaking bishop since the famed Bishop Bedell of Kilmore. In his charge, in 1867, Gregg observed that in a little more than five years nine churches had been built, three were in the course of building, and 30 had been improved. Today St Lappan's is part of the Cobh and Glanmire group of parishes where the Rev. Adrian Moran is the priest- in-charge.

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Yesterday morning the Archbishop of Dublin presided at a service to celebrate 150 years of St John the Baptist's Church, Clontarf. The preacher was the Archbishop of Armagh. Clontarf is an ancient foundation and in the Middle Ages the parish belonged to the Hospitallers of Kilmainham. A new church was built in 1609 dedicated to St John the Baptist but with the onset of suburban growth in the 19th century it became too small. A plot of ground on what is now Seafield Road was provided by John Vernon and a new church was built. It was consecrated on May 14th, 1866 and the Archbishop of Dublin, John Henry Bernard preached in the morning and Canon FW Mervyn, a former rector, preached in the evening. The present incumbent is the Rev. Lesley Robinson.

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The inaugural meeting of the new St

Augustine's Cub Pack has taken place at the church hall in Palace Street – former home of the First Londonderry pack. The first recruits enrolled under the watchful eye of Rector, Rev Malcolm Ferry, District Scout Commissioner Richard Edgar and Joan Reid of Scouts NI. New pack leaders Lori Campbell, Christine Brace, Roger Hamilton and Caroline McCartney led activities.

Among those lending a helping a hand was Dickie Montgomery, who recalled his own first outing as a cub – to a camp in County Antrim – 68 years earlier. It was a nostalgic occasion, too, for Canon John McKegney, who was present at the meeting; Canon McKegney is a former member of the First Londonderry pack. His father, Canon Herbert McKegney, was a former Rector of St Augustine's and a Scout Leader.

Tuesday evening's meeting marked the return of scouting to the centre of Londonderry after a 44-year absence. The original First Londonderry Troop ceased operating in 1972 because of the deteriorating security situation.

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The Rev. Ted Woods, who was Rector of Rathfarnham until his retirement in 2014, has

Activists yesterday said both the church and the remains of the original pillar on which St Simeon is said to have spent 47 years in prayer and contemplation, have been damaged in an airstrike.
