#### ZAMBIAN COMMUNITY CENTRE FUNDED BY TYRONE DONATIONS

A Zambian community centre paid for and built by the people of Tyrone will enhance lives for many generations to come, a Catholic women's group who use it has said.

Conor Sharkey of the Ulster Herald, in Lusaka - On Saturday, hundreds of people gathered in the country's capital city, Lusaka, to see St Theresa's Community Centre officially blessed and opened. Among those speaking at the event was the Arch Bishop of Lusaka, Telesphore George Mpundu, and Fr James O'Kane, the Omagh priest who worked as project director on the new parish centre.

Euphemia Chambolo is part of the Catholic Women's League that regularly uses the centre for meetings and to pray. She said they owed a great debt of

gratitude to the people of Ireland and said they would always be in their prayers.

Ms Chambolo told the TyroneHerald, "It is a centre, yes, but it is also the centre of what we do. It gives us somewhere to congregate, to pray and to share ideas. It has improved the standards of this environment and it has added so much value to all our lives. Many people who come to this area have been admiring it so it also gives us a sense of pride. It brings us together so while it is a community centre, it is also the centre of this area now."

Work on St Theresa's began seven years through the Omagh-based Paul McGirr Foundation. The late Paul's brother Michael was in Lusaka on Saturday to see the ribbon cut on St Theresa's. The Foundation has already begun work to extend the St Theresa's by building a training centre. It will teach young people in Lusaka skills that will help them to become mechanics, joiners and other trades.

Ms Chambolo continued, "Skills development is very important and adds value to human life for everyone. The young people are going to be able to learn these skills and they will help them become economically empowered. They are the future of our church and it is important they have life skills when they are growing up."

The Paul McGirr Foundation has been the lightening rod for amazing changes in one of Lusaka's poorest regions. And those who use St Theresa's say they will be forever grateful. "Without the people of Ireland we would not have reached this level and we thank them and put them in our prayers. They have done a tremendous job in identifying this area and giving us this wonderful community centre. All those have had a hand in building it and those back in Ireland who we have never met, we continue to bless them. We also offer a special prayer to the SMA and thank you all so much for having the heart to come and help us and hopefully this relationship can continue years after today," Ms Chambolo added.

#### LIVELY & FRUITFUL MEETING OF CATHOLIC PRIESTS

# According to a report on the meeting published on the the association's website, one major topic discussed was the declining number of priests.

Irish Times - "Many angles of this problem were raised, ranging from the pressure being put on priests in their old age to the further decline of local communities when they are deprived of a resident priest.

"It was stressed that we should not look on this issue in a clericalist way since it is a matter that concerns the whole church."

Also discussed was the new missal "and the question of whether there was anything that could be done about it at this stage".

Feedback to the association's leadership "was generally very positive".

"It was mentioned that some priests do not approve of us, but the feeling was that, while a great many priests do not want to be bothered by going to meetings or even joining, that generally the work of the association is appreciated and valued."

Founder member Fr <u>Brendan Hoban</u> said that a purpose of the meeting was to attempt to improve communications with the dioceses.

He acknowledged that the association, which operates without office or secretarial facilities, had not always been able to keep lines of communication as open as the leadership would wish. This week's meeting was mainly for the diocesan representatives to talk to the leadership.

In general the meeting was "lively and fruitful" with "a great sense of freedom and openness in the contributions that were made", and "as has become the norm at ACP meetings".

At its conclusion the association's leadership felt it was "much clearer on the message we would like to bring to the bishops if and when they agree to our request for a meeting".

# PRIEST ACCUSED OF USING PARISH MONEY TO FUND HIGH LIFE

A flamboyant priest accused of stealing €500,000 from the Franciscan order in Dublin to fund a lavish lifestyle faces expulsion from the clergy if found guilty.

Irish Independent - Father Anthony Egan was arrested last Wednesday and questioned by detectives after it emerged that a significant sum of money from parish donations was missing. A file is being prepared for the DPP.



#### A Franciscan order

spokesperson last night told the Sunday Independent that they are cooperating fully with gardai in the investigation.

Gardai arrested Fr Egan following a tip-off from a senior member of the clergy.

The priest faces accusations of using €500,000 stolen from the church diocese to fund a lavish lifestyle for more than a decade.

According to reports, the priest enjoyed multiple trips to <u>Paris</u> and <u>Monaco</u> each year. The 59-year-old is believed to have a fascination with Monaco's royal family.

He is also believed to have spent the money on expensive shoes and clothes and to have spread his finances over multiple bank accounts.

Under canon law, a priest is entitled to receive one stipend from financial donations made during Mass collections. Additional stipends cannot be claimed if the priest celebrates more than one Mass a day.

If Fr Egan is found guilty of misappropriating funds within his diocese, he faces being defrocked from the clergy and will have to relinquish all responsibilities within the Church.

Fr Egan was previously cleared of criminal charges in February 2012 after he was alleged to have falsely advertised his services as a psychiatrist in a national newspaper.

At the time of the investigation, it was believed Fr Egan referred to himself publicly as a psychiatrist, and members of his old church, St Audeons, said they received post addressed to 'Dr Egan' as recently as six months ago.

The court heard Fr Egan placed the ad in the Irish Times because he wanted to build up his client base and earn some money.

The court heard that during Garda questioning the priest claimed he had studied at Harvard University. However, there is no record of him having studied there. The court also heard that the priest had been duped into paying €1,000 to complete an online course in psychiatry, at the end of which he was presented with a fake degree.

An investigation into the newspaper advertisement began after it was seen by the Archbishop of Dublin, Dr <u>Diarmuid Martin</u>, who contacted the gardai.

#### A MUSICAL RECORD?

It may be a musical record, with a 90-year-old in the ranks of Portadown Male Voice Choir – none other than Harrison Morrow, baritone. Portadown Times - Harrison reached the milestone this week, and to mark the occasion, the ensemble had him a special cake baked. It was handed over by chairman Dr Alan Turtle and by conductor Gordon Speers.

Harrison also played leather-upon-willow for Armagh and Portadown.

Originally from the primatial city, he started singing as a cherubic boy soprano in St Patrick's Church of Ireland Cathedral at the tender age of eight and remained until his voice broke.

Memories include the fact that Church of Ireland chants were the thing in those days and that the outbreak of World War Two was announced from the pulpit one Sunday morning.

On the cricket field, he starred for Armagh and then Portadown, his fondest memory being circa 1950 when Portadown beat Laurelvale in the Junior Cup Final on the hallowed turf of The Lawn in Waringstown. Billy Martin was captain and he hit the winning boundary.

Harrison has served the male choir for 53 years. His gold medal was presented in 2011 when the choir performed at Áras an Uachtaráin, the official residence of the Irish President when Mary McAleese was the incumbent and enjoyed the PMVC dulcet tones.

"I've enjoyed every minute of the choir," said Harrison as he received the cake. "I have no plans to retire as long as the voice holds up. Our greatest triumphs have been at Cork International Festival where we have a terrific rapport with the knowledgeable audiences."

And to prove the point of non-retirement, he's off to Dungannon tonight (Friday) where the choir is preforming a St Anne's Church of Ireland.
