

Magherafelt Methodists Help Ugandan Charity

After leaving school in 2013, Joanne from Magherafelt Methodist Church spent 10 weeks of her gap year working in a Christian charity outside Kampala called Dwelling Places which

rescues, rehabilitates and resettles

abandoned and abused children into loving homes. Dwelling places cares for around 25 children in its home and works with another 400 children and families in the local community.

Inspite of the excellent work carried out by Dwelling Places, they often find it difficult to raise money to continue the project and to send the children to school. In 2013 they accumulated a number of debts and there was a worry that they would not be able to send the children to school. Therefore, before leaving for Uganda, Joanne organised a coffee morning at Magherafelt Church where she colleced £2,300 for the project which enabled them to help pay off their debts and continue their work.

Joanne said, "The experiences I had during my time in Uganda were amazing.... The children stole my heart and I cannot wait to go back to Uganda and work with again." - See more at: http://www.dwellingplaces.org/

Diocese of Down and Dromore launches appeal for South Sudan

Even though a ceasefire is in place and Western Equatoria is calm, Bishop Justinof D & D's link diocese of Maridi has expressed great need.

Displaced people have flooded into the town and surrounding areas, putting a squeeze on resources. The price of essential commodities has risen as their scarcity increases and there are many more mouths for the church to feed. Security is also a concern.

A diocesan spokesperson said - On, 16 January, the Diocesan Council (at the request of the Council for Mission) voted to give the developing world allocation to Maridi, a sum of £4000. They also decided to launch an appeal for South Sudan so that parishes would have the opportunity to give. Collections will be taken in our churches on Sunday 2 February so please prepare to give to our brothers and sisters to help them meet the needs of the desperate people in their midst.

We thank God for the ceasefire but the situation in the country is unpredictable. Should we have money left over it will be redistributed in other needy areas of South Sudan through CMS Ireland (who themselves have donated £3000 to Maridi diocese)

Banned comic play about Bible expected to sell out

The comic play about the Bible that was cancelled, then reinstated, by a County Antrim council, is expected to sell out.

The Bible: The Complete Word of God (Abridged) had sold only 150 of a possible 800 seats before the controversy erupted last week. Only six tickets were left unsold at 21:30 GMT on Tuesday. The play's two-night run at Newtownabbey Borough Council's Theatre at the Mill begins today, Wednesday. The council box office extended its opening hours on Tuesday, and its website also crashed because of a surge in demand.

The play was originally cancelled by the council's artistic board after complaints from some councillors that it was blasphemous. However, after widespread condemnation of the move, the artistic board changed its mind on Monday night, and the council ratified the decision to let the play go ahead.

The Reduced Shakespeare Company was already rehearsing the play at the Theatre at the Mill before the council performed its U-turn. See also -

Three Ulster Peers join former Archbishop in plea to Prime Minister on Syrian refugee resettlement

Viscount Brookeborough, Lord Maginnis of Drumglass and Rt Hon Lord Kilclooney of Armagh joined The former Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Rowan Williams, bishops, crossbenchers and peers from all parties in an open letter to Prime Minister David Cameron, urging a positive UK

government response to the call for re-settlement of some Syrian refugees in Britain and other European countries.

The letter, published in the Independent newspaper late last week, is a response to a plea from the United nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

"Only a resettlement programme will offer a durable solution for the most vulnerable who will struggle to survive in the harsh conditions in the region," the peers acknowledge.

In full, the letter reads as follows:

"We are deeply concerned about the growing Syrian refugee crisis which you have accurately described as 'the greatest refugee crisis of our time'. As you will know, more than two million people have fled the country, including over one million children, the majority of whom are now living in extremely precarious circumstances. Figures suggest that only around 0.1 per cent of the people fleeing the conflict have found safety in the UK while 97 per cent, are being hosted by the neighbouring countries.

"We write to you today to urge you to heed UNHCR's call to help the countries bordering Syria by establishing a co-ordinated resettlement programme in the UK with a focus on the more vulnerable refugees, including women at risk, those with disabilities, vulnerable older adults and families with children.

"We commend you for pledging £600 million in humanitarian aid to assist people in Syria and the region. However, we are extremely concerned to hear reports of domestic violence, sexual abuse and rape from the camps on the border, and with the arrival of winter and freezing temperatures, these are plainly unacceptable environments for many at risk.

"Only a resettlement programme will offer a durable solution for the most vulnerable who will struggle to survive in the harsh conditions in the region.

"You are well aware of the scale of the crisis which shows no signs of abating. UNHCR has predicted that next year the total Syrian refugee population will increase to over 4 million. Unsurprisingly, given the numbers crossing their borders, Syria's neighbours are buckling under the strain. We are extremely alarmed to hear that scores of people trying to escape the fighting, including families with small children, are being denied admission by neighbouring countries. According to an April 2013 survey, 71 per cent of Jordanians want the border with Syria to be closed to new arrivals. With thousands of people fleeing Syria everyday, this would be catastrophic.

"There is a moral imperative on western countries to show solidarity with Syria's neighbours by sharing the responsibility of protecting some of the people fleeing Syria.

"UNHCR has called for western countries to take 30,000 people through resettlement or humanitarian admission with a focus on the vulnerable, a modest target given the scale of the crisis. So far 18 countries, including Germany, France and the USA, have responded to this call. Despite our proud tradition of protecting refugees, the UK has yet to respond.

"We urge you to work with the UNHCR and the international community in the establishment of a global resettlement programme to help the most vulnerable find safety outside of the region. We must play our part in providing a safe haven to Syria's refugees.

"We would be grateful for your thoughts on this issue and would welcome the opportunity to meet with you to discuss it in more detail."
