We gathered in this beautiful church once again for the annual ILFA Service and we were joined online by many people across the country who tuned into the live stream of the event.



## St John's Voices 'reincarnated' as the Cambridge University Schola Cantorum

The Cambridge mixed choir St John's Voices (SJV), which was disbanded by the College Council earlier this year to the dismay of its musicians, has been independently "reincarnated" as the Cambridge University Schola Cantorum

The new mixed choir is being directed by Graham Walker, who is the Director Of Music at Emmanuel College and the former director of SJV (News, 28 March).

The choir, his idea, was established over the summer with help from its resident composer, Tim Watts, and a "wonderful" management team of staff and students, Mr Walker told the Church Times on Wednesday.

"We've been appointing talented and experienced singers from across the University and beyond, including several who have previously sung with King's and St John's College Choirs."

A new website, launched last week with new social media channels, describes the Schola Cantorum as "emerging from the embers of its predecessor St John's Voices" to offer "an exceptionally high-quality, committed musical experience for listeners and performers alike".

We are trying to get in touch so if this is you, please do send us a message!


There's something poetic about this matchstick model coming to light (no pun intended) during the 40th anniversary of our last major fire in 1984!

## Military Chaplaincy and the Church of Ireland Liturgy

Within the Armed Forces a significant number of Chaplains (Regular and Reserve) come from the Church of Ireland - a C of I Chaplain writes on a Facebook site mainly for chaplains.

When we join the Armed Forces we receive our licence from the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Even though we hold the Archbishop's licence we retain the uniqueness of the Anglican Province from which we come.

An essential part of being a Chaplain on the Armed Forces involves bringing the liturgical tradition of your sending Church to the people we serve. In in our case that of course, involves the Book of Common Prayer as we have received it within the Church of Ireland.

For the past number of weeks I have been in Albania on exercise. Approximately 30 soldiers from Nothern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland deployed on the exercise. No less than 12 soldiers approached me to say that they were part of the Church of Ireland. The soldiers came from places such as Belfast, Larne, Londonderry, Ballymena, Enniskillen, Carrowdore and one person even from Passage in Cork!

On the exercise, I held a number of 'Field Services'. Each of the services were well attended. My smallest had 30 and the largest service had an approximately 100 in attendance. Interestingly they freely chose to join the services, no one

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forced them. As a Church of Ireland Minster in the Army I used the liturgy I am expected to use - the Church of Ireland, Book of Common Prayer.

It meant a lot to those 12 Church of Ireland soldiers to hear the familiar words of the Prayer Book. In a special way the liturgy reminded them of home. Hearing the words of the liturgy provided a real boost to their morale. Even though they were thousands of miles from home and in a difficult and arduous environment, the liturgy enabled the soldiers to find strength from God using the familiar words of the Prayer Book.

If you have soldiers from your parish who have joined the Armed Forces - fear not! There is a goodly number of Church of Ireland clergy in the Armed Forces who are caring for them and ensuring their faith not only grows but flourishes.

Please pray for all those Church of Ireland soldiers who are deployed overseas and away from their families.

## October 7, 2024 - A Year of Weeping - the Episcopal Church in Europe

"As he came near and saw the city he wept over it, saying, 'If you, even you, had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes...." —Luke 19:41-42

October 7 brings around the saddest of anniversaries. On this day a year ago, at 6:30 in the morning, some six thousand Palestinian militants entered Israel and murdered more than a thousand Israelis, the vast majority of them civilians. Some 265 Israelis were forced back into Gaza as hostages; while some have been released, many are known to have been killed or to have died in captivity, and at least sixty living hostages are believed to remain in Gaza.

An immeasurable amount of human suffering and misery has followed these horrifying events, but it is important to remember how it began. And while it seems almost ridiculous to have to say so, it is equally important to keep in mind some basic premises:

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Israel has a right to exist, and a right to exist as a Jewish state.

The Palestinian people have a right to live, to live in peace, and to be free to choose their own leaders.

No approach to security that holds as a premise the eradication of another people or another state can ever be justified.

Life is sacred, and those in positions of leadership are bound to respect the sacredness of all life in the policies they pursue.

We have no choice but to care about this. We are Christians; our own story is rooted in the ground now being devastated by war. Yet a grim year on from the beginning of a series of conflicts that have now taken the lives of some seventy thousand people, and caused two million to be forced from their homes, it is difficult to see how this violence can possibly be brought to a peaceful end. Each of the many parties to this conflict holds tenaciously to an existential understanding of the stakes in play, seeing their very survival as hanging in the balance. And that, to be sure, is not a promising beginning to any negotiation.

It seems clear that no peace can be found until the festering wound that has long been the frustrated aspirations of the Palestinian people for sovereignty over their own land is addressed. And it is equally clear that murder, rape, and kidnapping cannot be justified as means toward that end.

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Ultimately the work of peacebuilding in the Middle East cannot be based merely on a stalemate in military force or the exhaustion of violence on the part of the combatants. The only sound foundation for a sustainable peace will be the transformation of hearts. That alone can bring those who make their resort to war to regard their adversaries as human — as children equally beloved of God.

That may sound hopelessly Pollyanna-ish as the bombs and rockets rain down. But in the end, it is the only realistic option. Deterrence, that grand idol of high policy, has utterly failed. Humanitarian considerations have exerted little restraint on the actions of any side in this disaster; depravity has been evenly spread across this troubled terrain.

The things that make for peace are not things; they are the aspirations, the longings, the courage of the heart. Only when these can be summoned in sufficient measure will peace be found. That is why the leaders of warring states often only find that courage when the people they lead insist on a different way, when the conscience of the wider community recognizes a humanity that leaders blind themselves to.

Our call as Christians is to support those voices who call for a rapid cessation of conflict, the return of hostages, and the insistence on protecting the legitimate interests of both Israelis and Palestinians. It is not the case that they are utterly irreconcilable; it is rather that a lack of imagination and a failure of courage have opened the gates of hell in the Holy Land. Only love can close them. Our words, our prayers, our work must all align with that reality.
