Pope welcomes Ukrainian President Zelensky to Vatican

Pope Francis welcomed Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky to the Vatican for the third time on Friday last.

During their 35 minute long meeting the Holy Father particularly expressed his concern at the suffering of Ukrainian children - so many of whom have lost the ability to smile.

This was their fourth encounter, after a bilateral meeting on June 14 on the sidelines of the G7 in the Puglia region of Italy and meetings in the Vatican on May 13, 2023, and, prior to the full-scale Russian invasion of Ukraine, on February 8, 2020.

According to a statement issued by the Holy See Press Office, the talks in the Secretariat of State were devoted "to the state of the war and the humanitarian situation in Ukraine," as well as "the ways that could put an end to it, leading to a just and stable peace in the country."

The statement also said: "a number of issues concerning religious life in the country were also examined."

Afterwards, President Zelensky met with Vatican Secretary of State, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, and the Vatican's Secretary for Relations with States and International Organizations, Archbishop Paul Richard Gallagher.

After the meeting, in a post on X, Pope Francis wrote: "All nations have the right to exist in peace and security. Their territories must not be attacked, and their sovereignty" must be respected and guaranteed through peace and dialogue. War and hatred bring only death and destruction for everyone."

During the meeting the two leaders exchanged gifts, and the Pope exchanged greetings with the delegation accompanying President Zelensky. The Ukrainian President gave Pope Francis an oil painting, entitled 'The Bucha Massacre. The Story of Marichka.'

Pope Francis gave President Zelensky a bronze casting of a flower engraved with the inscription: 'Peace is a fragile flower.'

The Pope also gave the President this year's Message for Peace, several papal documents, the book on the 27 March 2020 Statio Orbis, edited by the Vatican Publishing House, as well as the volume 'Persecuted for Truth, Ukrainian Greek Catholics Behind the Iron Curtain.'

Pope Francis has made countless appeals for an end to the war and the suffering since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, and has offered the Holy See's availability to help in any way to work toward peace. The Holy Father has also sent delegates and envoys delivering ambulances, medical supplies, and aid to the suffering nation.

C of I tribute to Bishop Donal Murray

Bishop Michael Burrows writes - I have conveyed to Bishop Brendan Leahy my sympathy and that of our diocese on the death of Bishop Donal Murray.

Bishop Murray made a large and positive impact on so many aspects of church life in this part of Ireland. He was an administrator, a thinker, a gifted pastor and an ecumenist. He knew too of the travails of life, recognised his duty to make personally costly decisions, and acted with humility and grace in doing so.

I came to know him well when he kindly acted as the Roman Catholic observer on our Commission on Episcopal Ministry and Structures some years ago. His interventions were scholarly, shrewd and good - humoured, offering a refreshing perspective on matters from episcopal elections to diocesan reconfiguration.

At my enthronement in Limerick in May 2022 Bishop Leahy gave me a copy of Bishop Murray's little devotional book 'What are we waiting for?' It sits constantly on my desk to this day. It is a study of our human pursuit of truth, beauty and goodness. It links me also to two godly bishops - its writer who wields his pen so gently and fluently, and its donor who gave his beloved predecessor such wonderful pastoral care during recent difficult years and amid declining health.

Again, my sympathy to the bishop, priests and people of the Roman Catholic diocese of Limerick at this time of parting.

Scriptural Reasoning: an online event with the Interfaith Working Group and Dublin City Interfaith Forum on Tuesday 5 November at 7.30 pm

Scriptural Reasoning is a form of reading, listening to and reflecting on scripture from different religious traditions addressing a selected theme. This session of scriptural reasoning will focus on the theme of 'Compassion'.

Contributors for this event will come from the Jewish, Christian, and Muslim faiths.

Our three contributors for this event are:



Jonathan Romain – Rabbi, writer and broadcaster Dr Al Tawash – Dublin City Interfaith Forum The Rev Dr Stephen Skuce – Methodist Church in Ireland

As part of the session, each contributor will be invited to give a brief introduction and reflection on their selected passage of scripture on the theme of 'Compassion'.

These introductions are intended to provide context to help other participants from different traditions who may not be familiar with the passage to enter into dialogue with the text.

After all three contributors have spoken, we will gather in smaller breakout rooms to discuss the three texts presented, giving equal time to each text. After the breakout rooms, we will re—gather in the main session for a short summing up and sharing from the different groups.

NB: Tickets for this event are divided into different faith groups. The purpose for this is not to exclude or limit participation, but rather to ensure that some diversity of representation will be possible across the discussion groups.

There is no limit on any of the tickets, and the listing is purely for the purpose of planning the breakout groups in advance.

First Irish visit of St Bernadette's relics to conclude in Athlone - Westmeath Independent

The holy relics of Saint Bernadette of Lourdes arrived in Ireland for the first time, and are being brought on a nationwide pilgrimage which will conclude in Athlone in early November.

The saint's relics will journey, for the very first time, to each of the 26 dioceses on the island of Ireland.

The tour of the relics is scheduled to end with a visit to the Diocese of Elphin, where they will be displayed in Athlone's Church of Saints Peter and Paul from November 2-4.

A farewell ceremony, to end the Irish visit, will then take place in the Church of the Risen Christ, Kiltoom, on November 5.

Parist priest of the parish of Saints Peter and Paul, Fr John Deignan, was in Galway Cathedral on Thursday last for a welcoming ceremony to mark the arrival of the relics, which had been brought from the grotto in Lourdes earlier in the week.

Discussing the plans for the Athlone visit, Fr John said: "We will have the relics on public display for veneration from Saturday November 2, to Monday, November 4.

"The programme is not yet finalised, but it will include designated Mass and prayer times, as well as times of private veneration and prayer."

The Catholic Communications Office pointed out that countless Irish pilgrims had made the journey to the International Marian Shrine at Lourdes for the last 166 years, since the apparitions of Our Lady to Saint Bernadette in 1858.

"This year the people of Ireland will have the opportunity to welcome the spirit of Lourdes and Saint Bernadette to a

local church in their own home diocese," it said in a statement.

The Bishop of Elphin, Kevin Doran, commented: "There is a well-established tradition of people bringing religious objects home from Lourdes, to share with family members and friends.

"Many people are unable to travel on pilgrimage to Lourdes, but this year Lourdes will come to them, as the relics of Saint Bernadette make their way around Ireland.

"We hope that many people will be able to share in the blessings of the Pilgrimage, by gathering to pray with Saint Bernadette in cities and towns across the country."

The relics will also be displayed at Christ the King Cathedral, Mullingar, on October 21 and 22, during their visit to the Diocese of Meath.

Welcoming the visit of the relics, Primate of All Ireland, Archbishop Eamon Martin said: "The pilgrimage around Ireland of Saint Bernadette's relics will be a source of hope, great joy and inspiration, especially for the many people of Ireland who have travelled to Lourdes over the years. "Of course Lourdes is synonymous with care and love for sick and disabled persons and it is a special sanctuary for those who struggle with worries or decisions of one kind or another."
