Cardinal Brady's resignation accepted by Pope

Pope Francis has accepted the resignation of Cardinal Sean Brady, the leader of the Catholic Church in Ireland.

News Letter - The senior churchman, whose final years as a clerical leader



were dogged by abuse scandals, announced plans to step down on age grounds last month after turning 75, the standard retirement age in the church.

At the time he had said he was eager for the Pontiff to accept his request to stand down, and this morning the Catholic church confirmed this had happened.

Among those wishing him well was top Presbyterian Rev Dr Donald Watts, President of the Irish Council of Churches, who praised his "gentle humility".

Archbishop Eamon Martin will now take over the role as Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland – the 116th man to fill the role.

"I am looking forward to retirement and, no doubt, it will take me some time to get used to it, but it will be good to have more time for family, friends and to follow the football," Cardinal Brady said.

The churchman faced repeated calls over the last few years from clerical sex abuse survivors to stand down.

The Most Reverend Dr Richard Clarke, Church of Ireland Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, praised Cardinal Brady's ecumenical work.

"He has been a good friend to successive Archbishops of Armagh and to the wider Church of Ireland throughout his archiepiscopate, and we are grateful to him for this unaffected generosity of spirit," he said.

"And, on a personal note, I wish to thank Sean for real kindness and warm friendship over many years. We all hope that he will enjoy both true fulfilment and good health in the years ahead."

Archbishop Clarke said he looks forward to working with his new Catholic counterpart

Last month Pope Francis promised to hold bishops accountable for the protection of children and begged forgiveness from victims after he celebrated a Mass with six survivors at the Vatican.

One of the six, Irish woman Marie Kane, said she asked the pontiff to remove Cardinal Brady from his post because of the way he handled abuse allegations.

In a farewell message Cardinal Brady said he recalled the Pope's motto "miserando atque eligendo" which he said "challenges and inspires me with its message of God having mercy and at the same time choosing us, despite our sinfulness"

"It reminds me that I too need to say sorry and to ask forgiveness. And I do so again, now," Cardinal Brady said.

"At the same time, Pope Francis' motto inspires me to trust in the mercy of God and to pray for the strength to do always as Jesus would have me do."

Cardinal Brady was heavily criticised for swearing two victims of paedophile priest Brendan Smyth to secrecy during an internal church inquiry in 1975 into the abuse of two children.

Their evidence was never handed over to police, allowing Smyth to continue abusing children before he was finally jailed in 1994.

Last December an investigation by church watchdog the National Board for Safeguarding Children said Cardinal Brady made a "commendable decision to gather and document whatever information was available" about abuse allegations in his own archdiocese on taking up his role as Primate of All Ireland in 1996.

At the time he said he was truly sorry for the suffering of victims.

Although he has also apologised to the victims of Smyth, he previously said he would not resign over the affair.

Cardinal Brady led the church in Ireland for more than 17 years during which time a series of investigations exposed shocking levels of clerical abuse.

His successor, Archbishop Martin, is a 52-year-old Derryborn former teacher, who was named as Coadjutor Archbishop of Armagh early in 2013. More at -

"Together with the member churches of the Irish Council of Churches I wish to congratulate Archbishop Eamon on his new ministry as Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland and look forward to working with him over the coming years".

Anglican Communion Secretary General elected bishop in Ireland

The Revd Canon Dr Kenneth Kearon, the Secretary General of the Anglican Communion has been elected as a bishop in the Church of Ireland.

ACNS - Canon Kearon, who was appointed to his current role in 2004, will become the next Bishop of the Diocese of Limerick and Killaloe. He succeeds the Right Revd Trevor Williams who retired at the end of July this year.

Responding to the news, Canon Kearon told ACNS, "I am honoured and delighted to have been elected to the Diocese of Limerick and Killaloe, and I look forward to getting to know the diocese, its people and its clergy well in the near future.

"Ireland has been through a very difficult period in its

history, and I look forward to helping the diocese play its part and making its contribution to shaping the future.

"This diocese has made a distinctive contribution to the Church of Ireland in the past, in part through the work of its bishops and most recently through Bishop Trevor Williams, and I hope to be able to continue in their footsteps."

Canon Kearon has served alongside two Archbishops of Canterbury: Archbishops Rowan Williams and Justin Welby. As the leader of the Anglican Communion Office - the secretariat of the Instruments of Communion - he has supported several Anglican Consultative Council meetings, Primates' Meetings, and the 2008 Lambeth Conference.

The Bishop-elect has travelled widely in his role, and is a well-known figure across the Anglican Communion.

In a statement issued by the Church of Ireland, the Most Revd Dr Michael Jackson, Archbishop of Dublin, said, "Canon Kearon has expressed his delight at returning to work in Ireland and his intention to serve the people of Limerick and Killaloe and the communities of which they are a part.

"I have known Canon Kearon for many years and have always appreciated his personal friendship. I wish Kenneth and Jennifer all that is best within the love of God in their time in Limerick and Killaloe."



East Belfast Mission director Houston dismissed

The director of the East Belfast Mission - the church group behind the Skainos social enterprise centre in east Belfast - is dismissed for gross misconduct after allegedly making false travel expenses.

BBC - The director of the East Belfast Mission has been dismissed for gross misconduct after allegedly making false travel expenses claims.

Mark Houston was removed from his £50,000-a-year post after an internal disciplinary panel made a finding of gross misconduct.

Mr Houston denies any wrongdoing.

East Belfast Mission (EBM) is the church group behind the multi-million pound Skainos social enterprise centre in east Belfast.

Worship

The group was set up in 1985 and engages in community development in the Newtownards Road area.

It employs a staff of around 90, and an additional 100 volunteers work there, offering homeless support services, employment and benefit advice, as well as a place to worship.

Mr Houston was responsible for the day-to-day running of the mission since his appointment as director in 2007. Before that, he was a pastor at the City Church based in the Holyland area of south Belfast.

The allegations made by EBM against him included falsifying documents in relation to travel expenses and the inappropriate use of a company credit card.

According to a disciplinary hearing, he also failed to comply with the mission's internet and email policy.

When asked, Mr Houston declined to make any public comment on the dismissal. He said he did not want to prejudice any future unfair dismissal case brought against the mission.

Claim

It is understood he strongly denies any wrongdoing and believes the reasons he was given for his dismissal are "deeply flawed".

Sources close to Mr Houston said he believed he had given plausible answers in response to the allegations made against him, but these were not accepted. The source also said that he felt he had been very badly treated.

Two other members of staff have also been let go following an internal investigation at the mission after questions were raised about their performance in their respective roles.

In a brief statement, the EBM confirmed that Mr Houston no longer works at the mission.

It said: "Mark Houston has been dismissed for gross misconduct, but this is now the subject of legal proceedings which will be heard in January.

"You will fully understand that EBM cannot therefore comment further at this time, as you will appreciate that we cannot say anything that might prejudice either party."

In a statement, the Department for Employment and Learning confirmed that Mr Houston had lodged a claim with the Office of the Industrial Tribunals and the Fair Employment Tribunal.

Prior to his dismissal, Mr Houston played a major role at the mission, helping to pioneer and promote the work of the landmark Skainos centre in east Belfast.

Mr Houston is also a member of the East Belfast District and Policing Community Safety partnership.

The Skainos project has received more than £20m in funding, with the vast majority of it coming from public funds, from European Peace funding and the Department for Social development.

A year ago, the then mission superintendent, Rev Gary Mason, said four members of staff had been suspended pending an inquiry, but said the suspensions were not for "earth-shattering" reasons.

God forgives me for raping woman and shooting her disabled son, says UDA killer Hinton

A barbaric killer who shot dead a disabled 14-year-old boy after raping his mother at gunpoint says God has forgiven him for the "drunken escapade".

Belfast Telegraph - Trevor 'Hinty' Hinton is now often seen in Belfast city centre singing hymns with a little gospel group.

Passers-by don't realise that the occasional preacher was convicted of a depraved sectarian murder and rape — and that 20 years later he carried out a hatchet attack on a defenceless Catholic man.

He raped Catholic woman Sarah McClenaghan and ignored her pleas for mercy as he shot dead her son David after breaking into their Oldpark home in north Belfast with three other UDA hoods in the early hours of July 12, 1972.

The sectarian psycho was freed from jail in 1989 but three years later he was jailed for 16 years after he and an accomplice ambushed a drunk Catholic

man and bludgeoned him with a hammer and a hatchet.

Now born-again Hinton claims God has forgiven him — and he even denies the rape and murder he confessed to in court.

When Sunday Life confronted Bible-bashing Hinton at his home in south Belfast, he brazenly said: "I pleaded guilty on the advice of a solicitor."

Hinton said: "Did I rape Sarah McClenaghan? No. Did I shoot her son? No."

However, he refused point blank to say who he believes raped and shot the widow and killed her son, David.

"I showed abject and true remorse when I was in prison and I apologised at the time and to Sarah's brother Brendan," he said.

"I have found forgiveness," said IHinton.

"It was a stupid drunken escapade that should never have happened. I tried to take my life because I couldn't live with it.

"In 1973 a prison officer spoke to me about Jesus and gave me a Bible. I've been a Christian from that day to this."

He refused to answer further questions at his home but later rang Sunday Life and said "only the Lord above knows" who committed the murder and rape.

He also complained that he should not have been charged with attempted murder for his 1992 hammer and lhatchet attack on a Catholic man.

Report that a legal bid to have bells at an 18th-century country church re-tuned to improve their melody has been thrown out of a court by a judge who said the plan was a threat to "our heritage". In a rare and possibly unique ruling Mark Ockleton, deputy chancellor of Hereford and a judge of the Church Consistory Court, rejected a re-tuning plan. The bells were installed at the church of St Michael at Michaelchurch Escley in 1732 and the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) recommended they should be re-tuned to make their peal more melodious. But Deputy Chancellor Ockleton has refused permission on the basis that sounds of the past - melodious or otherwise - should be preserved for posterity as they were.
