The power of Easter lies not just in the life it offers us, but also in the way we are recruited to be life-bringers. This week, the role of love in leading us to life – and enabling us to bring life to others – stands out in the Lectionary. Love is never easy, it is always messy, unpredictable and scandalously inclusive. But, if we seek to follow Christ, we cannot avoid the privilege and the responsibility we have to be people of love.

May your worship lead into this love of Christ, and into his life, a little more this week.

INTRODUCTIONS

For use by lectors, in order of service, parish bulletins and magazines

The First Reading - Acts 11: 1-18 or Leviticus 19: 1-2, 9-18

Acts 11 : 1-18

These Acts are those of the risen Christ in and with his church. The Jerusalem church here calls on Peter to justify his eating and preaching among Gentiles, and they realise that the new life in christ is not restricted to a privileged few.

The Psalm - Psalm 148

A psalm exhorting all of creation and all peoples to praise God.

The Second Reading - Revelation 21: 1-6

Our weekly readings are giving us some of John's visions of the glory of the risen and ascended Christ, worshipped in heaven by all the faithful. At the end of this age, John believes, there will be a new heaven and a renewed world, and God's presence will fill them both.

The Gospel Reading - John 13: 31-35

The Gospel takes us back to the night of the Last Supper. Judas has gone out to betray Jesus, who now speaks of his own destiny not as failure but as glory, fulfilling to the uttermost God's way of love.

Remembering our most glorious and blessed Virgin Mary, N, and all the saints, let us offer ourselves and one another to the living God through Christ. To you, O Lord.

Blessed are you, God of glory, who gave us your Son. Hear the prayers we offer this day, come among your people, and wipe away every tear from their eyes; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE 2

Here is a prayer of commitment for Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, but it would work well in many other situations as well.

Holy God, may we hear your voice In the stillness of night, in clatter of day You call us, and we respond, Here I am! May we follow you and **May we love as you love.**

Holy One, through trials and turbulence Make us steady, your hands Holding strong the fragile and weak **May we love as you love.**

Gracious God, may the fruits of our lives be food for the hungry, bread clothing, shelter, fire, water, Word **May we love as you love.**

God of justice, remove the barriers Of our lives that keep us from One another, barriers we construct Based on skin color, religion, or gender May we hear, and follow, graciously. **May we love as you love.**

Loving God, take this day our fears our Worries, distractions, and all Turn them into grace and mercy, And, following the example of Martin Luther King, Jr. and all your Saints, **May we love as you love.**

LECTIONARY NOTES

REFLECTIONS ON THEME:

The Easter message shifts this week from Jesus' offer of life to us, to the way we seek to live out that life as we follow him – and it's a startling message of inclusivity and love. Jesus' new commandment is frequently sung and quoted, but the "one another" that Jesus' calls us to love is often limited to Christian believers. Now, in the lectionary, as the Gospel is laid aside the other readings, we realise that this "one another" goes much further. In Acts, we discover that the previously excluded Gentiles are now included in God's Kingdom. In the Psalm, all of creation is included in this "one another" as the entire creation is exhorted to offer praise. And in John's Revelation vision, we discover that God

so includes all, that God moves God's dwelling place ("heaven") into our earthly neighbourhood. There can be no greater, all-encompassing statement of love for all from God. We have no more excuses for turning the Gospel into an exclusive message!

CONNECTING WITH LIFE:

GLOBAL APPLICATION: One of the big questions of our generation is "who is in and who is out?". Global economic and trade regulations are designed to favour some (who tend to be the wealthy) and disempower others (who tend to live in third world countries). Political conversations are always being drawn in partisan ways with clear lines indicating who is on which side - and woe betide those who try to cross those lines. Religious communities and power structures, equally, have tended to focus on who is with us and who is against us. From geographical to economic to political to religious to racial to sexual to generational lines, our world is built on defining who is in and who is out. The prophetic Church, the Church of the resurrection, of love, of the God who lives among us, must be a Church that blurs every line, and invites everyone into the grace and love of God – and a Church that challenges the lines that exclude and oppress. This is what Jesus calls us to when he instructs us to love one another, and it is what is demonstrated in Peter's willingness to minister to the Gentiles in Cornelius' house, and in God's gift of the Spirit to these "outsiders". In practical terms, then, we are called to be those who will reach cross the lines to welcome and embrace those who believe, think, dress, behave and live in ways that we would consider different.

LOCAL APPLICATION: In recent years the worship of the Church has been strongly divided along stylistic and generational lines. More and more churches are discovering, though, that any church or service that is built on division or exclusivity is bound to fail. Increasingly we are witnessing that the most healthy, vibrant and growing communities are those that include – that bring diverse people together to worship, to learn from each other and to learn to love one another. This is not easy, but if we seek to reach people who are not part of any church, if we seek to make an impact on our wider community, then we need to demonstrate that we can live the message we preach, and that those we seek to reach will be included and loved and brought into contact with a loving and inclusive God – not judged or condemned in the hopes that the fear of hell or God's rejection will scare them into the Kingdom. It also means that, as the people of God, we need to learn to love one another across denominational, theological and practical boundaries. Furthermore, this love must extend out from the church to include those of other faith and cultures. This is the challenge we must face in our worship this week.

SERMON OUTLINE

John 13:31-35 When he had gone out...

Jesus had just washed the disciples' feet & proceeded to talk about his betrayal at the hands of Judas... Abruptly Judas left the room & *when he was gone v31 Jesus said....* He continues The Upper Room Discourse – preparing the disciples for what lay ahead...

1. The Comment 31-33: *Jesus said, Now the Son of Man has been glorified* – despite knowing the horror ahead...

a) Judas' darkest hour – as he slipped away from the Upper Room & *went out - & it was night* – into the darkness of the night – with darkness in his soul....

b) Jesus' finest moment - God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself & will glorify him at once. He would soon be returning to the Father - I am with you only a little longer..

2. The Command 34: *34I give you a new commandment, that you love one another.* – at the heart of the Gospel...

Tertullian – early Xian writer:- *See how these Christians love one another* – still the command of Christ!

3. The Commitment 35 – that is required then & now...

a) Loyalty to Christ - everyone will know that you are my disciples – as you put my teaching into practice daily...

b) Love for others – the core of Christ's teaching...

St Jerome tells of John's old age when a favourite expression of his was *Little children, love one another.* Questioned why he kept saying this, he said: *Because it is the precept of the Lord & sufficient if only it is done...* May we be enabled to put that teaching into practice!
