The First Reading - Acts 7: 55-60 or Deuteronomy 6: 20-25 The Psalm - Psalm 31: 1-5, 15-16 The Second Reading - 1 Peter 2: 2-10 The Gospel Reading - John 14: 1-14

Introductions to readings

Acts 7 : 55-60

Stephen was the first Christian to follow his Master to execution. The Jewish leaders found the teaching, that the crucified and resurrected Jesus is their true Messiah, was even more dangerous and heretical than Jesus's own life had been.

1 Peter 2 : 2-10

This writer, after the encouragement we have heard from him since Ester, now directs us to think of Jesus as the foundation stone on which the church is built. Although the resurrection is a stumbling-block to many, we have been chosen by God to proclaim its truth.

John 14 : 1-14

Jesus taught his disciples how completely he and his heavenly Father are united. We are to believe and trust his promise, that to know him is to know God, and he is our way to the place prepared for us.

Prayers

Collect One

O Almighty God, who alone canst order the unruly wills and affections of sinful men; Grant unto thy people, that they may love the thing which thou commandest, and desire that which thou dost promise; that so, among the sundry and manifold changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed, where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Collect Two

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: Grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity.

Prayers of the people

Let us pray for the peace and welfare of all people, especially for those whose lives are threatened by violence:-

Loving and eternal God, who brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus Christ after his had suffered a violent death, stay the hand of the murder, turn the passions of disordered humanity from hatred to respect for life. Lord hear us.

Lord, hear our prayer, and grant us your peace.

Eternal Ruler, who will bring to perfection this creation, let the rule of your Kingdom be confessed by all who the welfare of others in their hands. Lord hear us. **Lord, hear our prayer, and let justice prevail.**

Bless, good Lord, the mission of the church, in making known the victory of Christ over sin and death. Let this victory appear in what we say, and in our deeds of caring for those in need through our welfare agencies and our individuals actions. Lord hear us. Lord, hear our prayer, and your compassion made known in word and deed.

As Jesus promised to prepare the way and there are many rooms in your house, give us grace to trust in your promise of eternal for those whom we love and for ourselves. Lord hear us.

Lord, hear our prayer, and let us see life in triumph over death.

Post Communion Prayer

Eternal God, in word and sacrament we proclaim your truth in Jesus Christ and share his life. In his strength may we ever walk in his way, who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Commission & Benediction

You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation. Therefore go out as God's own people to proclaim the mighty acts of God in Christ.

We go in peace to love and serve the Lord, In the name of Christ. Amen.

A most frequently read NT passage - especially at funerals....

1. Trouble 1a: follows telling Jesus telling the disciple of his departure 13.33: where I am going you cannot come. Naturally they are devastated - deeply troubled... As ever, Jesus brings distinctive comfort in those memorable words...

2. Trust 1b-4: Trust in God, trust also in me - heart of Xian faith - makes all the difference in our times of trouble!

He speaks of their Future: There are many rooms in my Father's house - mansions (AV) - great houses of old - wonderful concept/beautiful picture of heaven!

Vulgate = mansiones = resting places on road/pilgrimage..

Wm Temple: wayside caravanserais along the route...

NRSV/Ampl - dwelling places; GNB/NIV/RSV - many rooms; The Message - plenty of room - room for plenty!

Wm Temple: a dragoman would make preparations for traveller.. I am going there to prepare a place for you. Jesus is the prodomus who went before us (Heb 6.20)

He then makes a wonderful promise: I will come back & take you to be with me that you also may be where I am..

3. Truth 5-14: J proclaims the truth of the Gospel in response to Thomas' question: Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way? Thomas' query enables us to hear a memorable reply: I am the way (v6) & the truth & the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

a) the Way - to be followed - cf the broad & narrow way (Mt 7:13/4)

b) the Truth - to be believed - ct many false prophets...

c) the Life - to be lived - blessings of eternal life...
