This week it's all about listening – to God's word – and to living it out in compassion, integrity and justice – which requires listening to others. This can be harder than it sounds with all the noise that bombards us each day. That's why the discipline of worship is so important. It gives us the time and the space to learn the practice of listening well.

May your listening abilities be enhanced by your worship this week.

INTRODUCTIONS

For use by lectors, in order of service, parish bulletins and magazines **The First Reading - Amos 8: 1-12 -** Amos sees a vision of a basket of ripe fruit, which God explains indicates that Israel is ripe for judgement. Amos then prophesies God's judgement against the corruption of God's people, and the famine of hearing God's word that is to come.

The Psalm - Psalm 52 - David speaks words of judgement against Doeg, proclaiming that he will be punished for his lies, while David will prosper under God's care.

The Second Reading - Colossians 1: 15-28 - Paul celebrates Christ as the visible image of God, the Creator and reconciler of all, and describes his ministry of proclaiming the Good News that leads us into relationship with God.

The Gospel Reading - Luke 10: 38-42 - Jesus is welcomed into the home of Mary and Martha. While Martha serves, Mary sits at Jesus' feet – and he refuses to chide Mary for this as Martha requests.

LECTIONARY NOTES 1

This week we have presented to us in the Gospel reading the two seemingly contradictory paths of the Christian life, the pious and the practical, or the spiritual and the down to earth. Last week we read about the Good Samaritan who cared for an injured man. His practical acts of kindness were contrasted with the pious priest and Levite who were more concerned with their religious purity than showing mercy and true religion.

This week we read about an apparently lazy Mary, who sits listening to Jesus whilst the practical Martha gets on with the chores. But Jesus does not call Mary lazy, Jesus tells Martha that it is alright for Mary to be still and listen to him.

Hopefully Mary was not a lazy person, but she did make use of the time when Jesus was around. She knew that there are times when jobs can be left and there was no need to justify her existence to Jesus by showing him how hard she could wash and cook.

Perhaps you feel that you are surrounded by lazy people and you end up doing all the work. Well perhaps this week it is time to listen to Jesus. There is no need to justify your existence to him, God's mission does not depend upon us slowly burning ourselves out and there will be time enough for working when we have enjoyed a day of rest.

LECTIONARY NOTES 2

REFLECTIONS ON THEME:

Truth and lies; prophecies and the silencing of prophecy; sitting at Jesus' feet or serving; Christ as the image of God, and the Gospel as the saving message that reconciles us with God. This week it's all about God speaking, and the question of whether we will listen or not. As tempting as it might be, based on the Gospel reading, to create a dichotomy between listening and serving, hearing and doing, the other readings don't allow us this. Listening to God's word is inextricably connected to following God's ways of justice, truth and compassion. Perhaps Jesus simply wanted Martha to listen before she acted, rather than assuming she knew what needed to be done? Whatever the case, the message of this week flows easily out of last week's theme. Not only are ordinary things powerful in the work of God's reign, it is as we listen to God's message and implement God's saving reconciling word through simple acts of justice, compassion and a commitment to truth and integrity, that we find ourselves living out the reality of God's reign in our lives and our world.

CONNECTING WITH LIFE:

GLOBAL APPLICATION: Words, used as propaganda, mere rhetoric or to inspire, are a massive feature of today's media-driven world. So many messages call us to label certain individuals or groups in certain ways. So many speakers claim to have the final word on certain situations or problems. So many speeches give little more than double-speak, finger-pointing or denial of responsibility. And, in all of the words, little actually changes. Lives are not saved. Injustice is not exposed and removed. Peace is not created, and solutions are not found to our big crises. One could be forgiven for thinking that we are living in the times Amos spoke about - a famine of God's word. But, God's word is not absent. It has not changed since Jesus lived it and preached it. The essential message of the Gospel – integrity, compassion and justice – has not changed or been silenced. All that is required is for those of us who follow the message of Christ to speak up, in words that are supported by accompanying actions, to challenge the empty words of our time, and call our leaders and our peers to account. But, we cannot do this unless we are prepared to be held to our own standards.

LOCAL APPLICATION: It is all too easy, in our personal lives and in our communities, to decide that we know what is needed, and what is to be done, without taking the time to listen. It is all too easy to speak, without taking the time to hear carefully and prayerfully, what God's message for us really is, or what the stories of those we seek to serve really are. If we are to be a people who bring Christ's grace and justice into our communities, we will need to listen carefully, and then act justly, compassionately and with integrity in response. We will need to avoid the temptation to assume we know what our communities need, and we will need to resist the urge to see ourselves as 'saviours' coming in to 'fix' things 'for' those who 'need' us. Rather we will need to adopt the humility of Mary, the

hospitality of Abraham, the commitment of Paul, the integrity of Amos, and the faithfulness of David, as we come alongside the people within and 'outside' of our churches, and speak, in listening and word and action, the Gospel message of Christ.

SERMON OUTLINE 1

Luke 10:38-42 Martha welcomed him...

Jesus on his travels entered a certain village – Bethany - El Azaryia – 2m from Jerusalem – East of Mt of Olives... Here he was always a welcome guest at the home of Martha, Mary & Lazarus - Martha welcomed him into her home. Probably she was the older as she takes the initiative...

1. Martha Opened her Home – so NIV – welcome extended also to the disciples in typical Eastern hospitality.. How would we feel if such a large group arrived at our homes unexpectedly? > Panic stations!! And that's what happened to Martha as she was distracted by her many tasks – with no help from her sister - has left me to do all the work by myself – all so human!

2. Mary Opened her Ears – to listen... By contrast she sat at the Lord's feet v39 & listened to what he was saying – intrigued & mesmerised... When Martha complains about the situation, Jesus replies lovingly Martha, Martha, you are worried & distracted by many things; ⁴²there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her.

3. Both Opened their Hearts – in reverence & love to JC - was a frequent visitor & close friend – as St John records:- ch 11- the raising of their brother Lazarus from the dead; ch 12 - Mary anointing Jesus... This same Jesus comes to us today in the page of Holy Scripture... How do WE receive him? May our homes be places of welcome to Him & may our hearts be truly open to receive Him as Lord & Saviour, King & Friend....

SERMON OUTLINE 2

Luke 10:38-42 a woman named Martha In the quiet village of Bethany – far away from the hustle & bustle of Jerusalem – was the home of Mary, Martha & Lazarus, whom Jesus had raised from the dead (John 11)

1. A Homely Welcome 38-39:- earlier Jesus had said he has nowhere to lay his head (9.58).. Here a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. It was a wonderful occasion – fully appreciated by Mary - who sat at the Lord's feet & listened to what he was saying..

2. Hard Work 40:- But Martha was distracted by her many tasks – all the preparations that had to be made... She became flustered & upset – rather peeved she complained to Jesus! 'Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me. It is wrong to be distressed – to complain – Phil 2.14:- Do everything without complaining. Service should be a joy!

3. Humble Waiting 41-42:- Martha was flustered – she needed to slow down & get her priorities right – no matter how important it was to be a good hostess... 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things;

Learn from Mary – she had a different attitude & temperament - sat at the Lord's feet & listened to what he was saying – sitting not becos of laziness but out of love! Mary had right priorities – listening, learning, loving...

⁴²there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her.'

All 3 are required in the household of faith – the Church – but we must prioritise like Mary – listen to, learn from, love Jesus - & then put it into practice! By Norman Porteous

Faith Formation Journeys

This site is new to us - Its worth a look. Click on Children's sermons. This week follows -

Preparation: get an assistant to either flash a light or make a small noise to distract you as you begin. Tell them to start out subtle before becoming more obvious to everyone.



Gather the children to you. Welcome them and start to tell them about the gospel story today. Prompt your assistant to start the light or noise distraction. As you start talking, fade off,lose your place, etc as you are distracted by the noise or light.



Say, "wow I really want to focus on this Bible story but it's hard, I keep getting distracted. Anyone else distracted?" Have the kids point out to you the distraction and then invite your assistant to join you. "This is like our bible story today. Jesus's visiting sisters Mary and Martha. Martha is making dinner and trying to get this ready to be welcoming to her guest. Well she gets distracted by her sister Mary of helping her and she gets upset and tells Jesus to help her get Mary to come help. Jesus knows Martha is distracted by her worry and frustration and tells her that Mary is focusing in on Gods word and has also chosen a good thing. Jesus wants Martha to remember what the main focus is of being welcoming and that is to show care for others in Gods name."



"Do you ever get distracted? What kinds of things distract you?" (Take answers, be prepared to prompt... Could mention the movie "Up" where the dog is always distracted by the squirrel or electronics, etc.). "Many things that are good and things that are not so food can distract us from remembering we are to focus on Jesus words and live our life base don his words and promises, even our thoughts and feelings can get in the way. I think I need that reminder to focus on Jesus and that many of us do. What are ways we can do this?" (Take answers, mention prayer and worship and reading scripture. If you use the inserts or other daily devotional in your congregation this is a great time to show it and teach again how to use it.



Jesus, you are our God. Help us focus on you. Thank you for your words of love for us. Amen



May your heart, hands, feet, head, words, and actions be focused on

Christ.
