Bird and bat boxes to encourage biodiversity at Mayo church grounds

Practical action is being taken to care for God's world at churches in Mayo, the Connaught Telegraph reports.

Westport Eco Congregation has supported Aughavale Parishes - Holy Trinity Church, Westport, Christ Church, Castlebar, Turlough Parish and St. Thomas Dugort in Achill in their efforts to encourage biodiversity on church grounds.

Eco Congregation Ireland (ECI) launched a small grant scheme to assist parishes to improve biodiversity and

energy in parishes. Westport was successful in receiving a small grant which enabled them to purchase bird and bat boxes.

The boxes were crafted by Patsy Fahy, a member of Westport Country Markets.

Andrew Orr, chair of ECI said: "We are delighted to receive generous sponsorship from RPD and Logos Publications, and we are looking forward to helping congregations north and south to put the care of God's world into practical action."

Half of US pastors plan to vote Trump, poll finds

According to a new survey, 50 per cent of US Protestant pastors have said they plan to vote for former president Donald Trump in the 2024 presidential election.

The Lifeway Research study also found that almost a quarter (23 per cent) declined to disclose their voting preferences – significantly higher than in previous elections, where just 4 per cent refused in 2020 and 3 per cent in 2016.

The poll, conducted between 8th August and 3rd September 2024, also showed that just under a quarter (24 per cent) of pastors plan to support Vice President Kamala Harris in her bid for the presidency, while no third-party candidate received more than 1 per cent backing.

Scott McConnell, executive director of Lifeway Research highlighted a trend of increasing hesitation among pastors to reveal their political leanings.

He suggested this shift could reflect the growing "sensitivity" and "divisiveness" of political discussions within church communities.

From Stormont to Belvoir

The Revd Emma Rutherford was instituted as rector of Belvoir Parish on the outskirts of Belfast last Wednesday evening by the Bishop of Down & Dromore, Rt Rev David McClay.

The rector had navigated part of the circumference of the city leaving her former parish church of St Molua's, Stormont where she and her family received presentations and prayerful good wishes for their future ministry.

The Revd Karen Salmon, Revd Karen Salmon, Bishop's Curate of Magherally and Annaclone and a colleague and friend of many years, gave the address. Belvoir Parish Church Magherally & Annaclone Church, Banbridge.

Belvoir Parish Church has a particular impact on a more modern aspect of the city's landscape. It is situated in a large, formerly Housing Trust estate but adjacent to one of the busiest dual carriageways around the city. Its events heralded on its noticeboard communicate.

A founder member of the parish informed CNI that Emma is their 6th incumbent, following in the esteemed footsteps of James Moore, Bryan Mayne, Desmond Hanna, Tom Keightley and Adrian McCartney.

Our correspondent continued, "I would also like to acknowledge the faithful group of people who selflessly kept the show on the road during the vacancy, both laity & clergy. Thank-you!"

CNI had the good fortune to see a very early photo of the Church and Hall, and one of the clergy procession at the Consecration. Included were: James Moore (later Bishop of Connor), Leslie Walker, George Quin (later bishop of Down & Dromore), Bishop Moore father of James, and the then Bishop of Down & Dromore Frederick Julian Mitchell.

In the background is the temporary hall, in which our correspondent was confirmed by Bishop Frederick in April 1963.

She said: As a family, we feel incredibly blessed to have been appointed to Belvoir Parish and look forward with excitement to this next stage of our journey." Emma shares more of her journey below

My background is in textiles, home furnishings and interior design, however about 20 years ago I felt God was calling me to other forms of ministry outside my local church. As a result, I spent four years employed as the family and children's worker in Knocknagoney Parish. This was the beginning of a journey, as I started to perceive a very definite call towards ordained ministry. I'm so grateful to

those who played an instrumental part of my call to ordination and I began training in Dublin in 2009.



I was ordained Deacon in Down & Dromore in 2011, serving my deacon intern year in St Jude's Ballynafeigh, and I was ordained Priest in Connor in 2012. In 2013 I started serving as Diocesan Curate with special responsibility for Glencairn Parish in North Belfast, with the addition of the responsibility of Whiterock Parish a year later. In 2017 I answered the call to Stormont Parish and have absolutely loved what has been a very blessed time with the people there.

I hadn't been looking for a new position, but God starting speaking to me in so many ways about Belvoir Parish. A series of conversations led me to pray and seek guidance over this, and it became more and more apparent as time went on that I should put my name forward for

consideration. Praying and fully trusting in God no matter the outcome, I entered the process, and was appointed.

Now, seven years to the day of my institution to St Molua's, I have been instituted as the rector of Belvoir Parish.

I'm doing what I do today simply because I met with Jesus and I love him and want to serve him. My prayer would be that others come to know him and experience the life in all its fullness that he offers. I pray that I will always give my best to God and never lose sight of the awesome privilege a life in ministry is.





Remembered in Drumbo Presbyterian Church and QUB

Campbell McNeill McCormack was a doctor, the son of a Presbyterian minister, who died in service as a medical officer in WW1. Yesterday was his anniversary. He served as a Major in the Royal Army Medical Corps.

He was awarded the Military Cross and 2 Bars and was Mentioned in Despatches MiD. Died 22/09/1918. Age 27. Educated initially at the Carr and Ballymacbrennan National Schools, he won a scholarship to Lisburn Intermediate School, subsequently Wallace High School, where he won exhibitions in the junior, middle and senior schools, and then an entrance scholarship of £30 to QUB to study medicine. After graduating MB in June 1914 and, having been in the OTC at Queens, (where he was the best shot in his Company and won four bronze medals for training), he joined the Reserve of Officers (RAMC) going to Aldershot at the end of June for preliminary training. On completion of this he expected to be able to return home to Drumbo for a short holiday but the outbreak of war intervened. Posted to Dublin for a short time, he susequently embarked for France on the night of 07/08/1914 with the medical contingent of the Aldershot Division.

Heavily involved in the retreat from Mons, he "came to prominence for good work bravely performed at ... Hill 60." Writing home afterwards, he commented that it was, "a miracle more of them did not get knocked out". He was also mentioned in dispatches, "for gallant and distinguished conduct in the field" in Sir John French's last dispatch. He was promoted to Captain from 01/04/1915 (London Gazette of 23/07/1915).

He was awarded the MC in September 1916. The citation published in the London Gazette read, "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during operations. He directed the stretcher-bearers under heavy shellfire with the greatest coolness and courage. He succeeded in entering a village which had been heavily shelled, and, with another captain, a sergeant and four men, collected the wounded into a dugout and succeeded in getting them back later. He has frequently shown great courage."

He was married to Ella Todd Warnock of Fernleigh, Endsleigh Drive, Belfast, in Drumbo Presbyterian Church on 12/09/1917. She was the only daughter of the late Rev. James Warnock, formerly minister of Drumbo and of Kroonstad, South Africa where he had gone for the sake of his health. One of the ministers officiating was the Rev. Joseph Cordner who may have been the father of James Cordner, who was KIA in April 1918. The best man was Hugh McCormack the bridegroom's brother who was later to have Campbell's death commemorated on his own headstone. The officers and men of 15 Field Ambulance gave them a silver salver.

Slightly wounded in late August/early September 1918, he was KIA in France on the 22/09/1918 two days after coming out of hospital and just over a year after his marriage. He was 27 years old and was serving in the 5th.(5) Field Ambulance RAMC.

Born 05/05/1891, he was the son of William McCormack, a farmer and Mrs. McCormack of Hillhall House, Lisburn, Co. Down, his death is also commemorated on his brother's (H.H. McCormack's) headstone in Drumbo Presbyterian church graveyard. He died on the 12/08/1980.

Writing to his parents shortly after his death, Major F.R. Thornton (RAMC) wrote, "I think by this time you will have received news of Major McCormack's death yesterday morning. A shell hit the shelter in which he and Colonel Bradley were sleeping and both were killed at once. He was buried yesterday afternoon in the cemetery close by in the presence of all the men of his ambulance who could be spared, and detachments from the other ambulances of the division. The General commanding the Division and many other officers were present. At the special request of the men his body was carried to the grave by the N.C.O.'s of the unit. It is difficult for me to express to you the deep sympathy that I feel, as I realise what a terrible loss it must be to you all. We all feel it most deeply, as he was beloved by officers and men. Of his unselfishness and courage it is needless to speak, for the men would follow him anywhere, or do anything which he asked them to do. I wonder if you have any small photographs of him, I should, myself, so much like one and the other officers are asking for it; in addition if you could let us have a few, I know how deeply some of our N.C.O.'s and men of his section would

appreciate them. With my very deepest condolence". Barastre Communal Cemetery, Pas de Calsis, France
